REPRESENTATIVE BODY MINUTES (2010-2011)

North Carolina Yearly Meeting Representative Body Minutes Eleventh Month, Sixth Day 2010 Ararat Friends Meeting, Ararat, North Carolina

Judy Ritter, Clerk of North Carolina Yearly Meeting, welcomed everyone and read the *Opening Minute*.

"When a man's ways please the Lord, he makes even his enemies to be at peace with him". Proverbs 16:7

May all we do and say today please the Lord. May we be at peace with ourselves, those on the right of us, those on our left, the ones we left in our house, those that are part of our meeting, the ones in our communities. We need not ask, for we know: "Peace begins with me".

Dennis Moore, pastor at Ararat Friends, gave the devotion using Matthew 20:4 as the scripture. We are told to have faith like a mustard seed. He gave several examples from the old TV series, "Mayberry". How do we respond to difficult times? Do we let our faith build up and grow? We live in challenging times so how do we respond? He then closed with prayer.

Eddie Reeves, Clerk of Ararat Friends Meeting, gave the welcome and a brief history of Ararat Friends. The Meeting was started in 1924 and has had four ministers. David Hobson's father was one of them. The meeting is still small in number but has a great spirit. This is the first time that Representative Body has been held at Ararat Friends Meeting.

The Agenda was **approved** with one addition. Mid-Year Gathering Minutes were **approved as corrected**. Yearly Meeting Minutes were **approved**.

Superintendent's Report: John Porter

Since Yearly Meeting, the following changes in pastor placement have been made: John Sides is at Oak Hill Friend, Bob Medford is pastor at Bethel, Hobert Freeman is pastor at Mt. View, Sara Beth Terrell has concluded her ministry at Pilot Mountain, and Michael Blythe is serving at Thomasville Friends Meeting.

John reported that preparation of the 2010 Minute Books has begun. It is important for those involved to get the information to the Yearly Meeting office in a timely manner. The purpose of the book is to serve as the record of Yearly Meeting activities from the end of one yearly meeting through the end of the next. Let the office know if you need an increased number of books.

He has spent time in the following activities:

- continued to work with Monthly Meetings in areas of conflict and growth
- visited the MOWA Choctaw Center with members of the advisory board
- attended FUM Board meeting in Richmond
- spoke at several worship times and held revival services at one meeting
- helped facilitate a move for Reece Wall to the Mocksville area
- attended meetings and committee meetings: Recording Committee, Ministry & Counsel Executive Committee, Friends Disaster planning, Mid-Year planning, Peace Conference planning, Church Extension long-range retreat, C.E.D.S. Board, Ministering to Ministers Executive Committee, NCYM Stewardship-Finance, Executive Committee, Quaker Lake Pumpkin Festival and staff meetings
- Consulted with and encouraged meetings to pursue the Natural Church Development process

Program Ministries Department Report: Darlene Pittman

The calendar for Quaker Lake is now available online.

Young Friends have many activities planned with Youth Tremors being held at Quaker Lake December 27, 2010-January 1, 2011 for anyone in grades 7-12. Registration forms are available.

Plainfield Meeting needs an intern and MOWA Choctaw Friends Center needs two interns. The After School Tutoring Program has been very successful and new interns need to receive training to work in this area. Christmas gifts and rummage items are needed for MOWA. It was announced that Pat Cheadle has "Carolina Snowflakes" available for sale with the proceeds going to MOWA. These items are handmade and would make wonderful gifts or tree decorations.

On December 4, 2010, the Young Adults will sponsor "Jingle-All-the-Way", a 5K Walk/Run, at Bur-Mil Park in Greensboro, NC. The proceeds will support the MOWA Choctaw Friends Center Christmas Box program which provides gifts for families in need.

Jamaica VBS 2011 will be using the "High Seas Expedition" curriculum. If your meeting has used this in the past and you would consider donating the materials, contact Darlene or the Yearly Meeting office. Last year NCYM had 22 participants serving with Jamaica VBS. Any of these people would be happy to come to your meetings to share their experience.

Friends Campus Ministries is seeking information on college students from local meetings. Many students from the Greensboro/Raleigh area will attend a conference for young adults in Atlanta during Christmas break.

The Spiritual Gifts Assessment is available on line and may also be downloaded and mailed in.

Bracky Rogers, White Plains Meeting, commended the youth and young adults of the Yearly Meeting for the work they are doing. He said that their enthusiasm bodes well for the future of North Carolina Yearly Meeting.

Quaker Men gave \$5,000.00 to Carolina Evangelical Divinity School and will have a Gospel Sing on March 19th in Surry Quarter as a fundraiser.

Executive Committee: Gwen Headen

The following persons have been approved to attend the 2011 FUM Triennial in Wilmington, Ohio as representatives: Myra Brady, Judy Ritter, Sara Pickard, Peggy Long, Gwen Headen, Clifford and Etta Florence Winslow, Bill Eagles, Kathy Kellum, Scott Wagoner, Brent McKinney, John Porter and Brandon Godfrey. It was approved that, if needed, substitutes may be appointed by the Executive Committee.

Gwen also reported that the Mid-Year Gathering will be held March 4-5th at Quaker Lake with Representative Body Meeting beginning at 3:30 pm. The reason for the change from Fort Caswell was financial. The Yearly Meeting does not have the funds available for the advance payment. Also, Young Friends cannot go this distance for just one day, so their program was going to be cancelled. It is a difficult time for families with several children to afford participation in multiple events. This change was **approved**. The program focus will be on missions.

Gwen went on to detail our strained financial condition. Some meetings are not giving their Askings. We started the year \$200,000 behind on our line of credit and we received \$100,000 less from trust funds from the previous year. The economy is worse and investments are down and our mission projects are bigger. We have not as of this date paid our commitment to FUM but have traded off one obligation to send FUM some money,

The staff has made sacrifices by not taking pay increases, not purchasing updates for computers and by assuming additional duties in the office. What can we do? Gwen asked us to pray about the financial situation and to give suggestions.

Stewardship and Finance Committee: Jimmy Spaulding

Jimmy reported that he or members of the committee would be happy to visit meetings and answer questions concerning the budget if requested to do so. **There will not be an increase in Askings this year.** The insurance contribution has increased from \$250 per month per insured to \$300. The dividends will be added to the General Fund **not reinvested**. He thanked the Yearly Meeting staff for their efforts to conserve funds. Young Friends and Young Adults, as well, have taken cuts in their budgets. The economic difficulties force difficult choices. **The 2011 Budget was approved.**

Treasurer's Report: Martha Jo Jones

Our giving is down and we have collected 70% of Askings for this year. Seven meetings are paid in full and 36 meetings are paid to date. We should have reached 83% by now. Some meetings have not paid at all and several are behind.

Brady Morrison stated that meetings should give a reason why they are not paying Askings. He also stated that, in his opinion, people should not serve on committees if their meeting does not pay their Askings.

Jan Greene spoke of a “committee on listening” which proved useful in a similar situation in another yearly meeting. Clifford Winslow spoke very movingly of a difficult situation in his own meeting and his inability to change the thinking of some meeting members. Pat Cheadle suggested that we not do anything which might make matters worse.

It was **approved** that the clerks of the Finance Committee and the Executive Committee meet together prior to Mid-Year Gathering to discuss the problem of non-payment and bring suggestions to the meeting.

Trustees of Trust Funds: Dick Coe

This committee has seven members who serve terms of seven years with a second term possible. They meet three times per year to review holdings, changes, expenditures and policy changes. Four percent of the Trust Funds go the General Budget on March 31st. The downturn in the economy has presented an enormous shortfall in income from these funds. This committee consults with professional money managers to secure the best possible outcome.

Cemetery Committee: John Allen

John sent a letter asking that funds be approved to erect a permanent marker at the Eno Cemetery without owning the property. (The Meeting was laid down and the membership was transferred to Spring Meeting). It was approved that this be done if the funds are presently available in the Cemetery Fund.

Nominating Committee:

Kevin Smitherman requested that Peggie Baxter be approved to serve as Clerk of FWCC to complete David Brindle’s term. **Approved.**

The name of Myers Johnson was omitted from the Committee on Clerks^(*), term to expire 2013. **It was approved to add this name.**

Program Committee Report:

The theme for Yearly Meeting in 2011 will be “INTEGRITY” but the speaker has not been chosen as yet. The evaluations have been looked at very carefully and will be used in planning.

Share the Blessing II:

Judith Cranford reported that, as of November 6, 2010, 19 Meetings have participated in the special offerings and \$11,834.00 has been received. A total of 57 meetings participated in 2009 and 3 meetings that did not participate in 2009 have sent funds this year.

Ministry & Counsel Report:

Linda Selleck reported that it is time once again to begin preparing the Spiritual Condition Reports.

These reports are to encourage the spiritual health of local meetings and they provide valuable information for the Minute of Advice. When the report has been approved by the monthly meeting, one copy should be sent to the Quarterly Meeting Clerk on Ministry and Counsel and one copy should be sent to the North Carolina Yearly Meeting Office. Reports should be submitted by April 1, 2011, so that Quarterly Meetings

can produce a summary report. **Quarterly Meeting summaries should be submitted to the Spiritual Life Commission by June 1, 2011.**

Meetings are asked to consider the following questions:

- 1) Are there areas where your meeting is especially strong?
- 2) Are there specific areas of fellowship or ministry where your meeting is not as strong as it would like to be?
- 3) Are there opportunities for spiritual growth, or growth in ministry?
- 4) Are there spiritual or practical threats to the meeting's ongoing practice of ministry and fellowship either from within or without the meeting?
- 5) Are there other things that need to be said?

Recording Committee:

Clerk, David Brindle reported on classes and the number of times that candidates for recording must meet with the committee.

Next year, the Spiritual Life Commission is planning a workshop on Spiritual Gifts in early winter and a third Yearly Meeting Revival sometime next year.

Christian Social Concerns Commission:

Hugh Spaulding reported on the "Celebration of the Peace of God" Conference to be held November 20, 2010 at 9:15. Dr. Matthew Johnson will be the speaker.

Friends Disaster Service:

Wiley Shore reported that the police and drug dealers were involved in a "shoot out" incident in Matamoros but that no one else was injured.

He reported on the repair to four homes in lower Alabama which were damaged by Katrina six years ago. The community was very appreciative and treated the group well.

Christian Vocations Committee:

Applications for assistance are due by December 1st and they are also available online.

USFW:

Mary Anna McCullen reported that the FUM and North Carolina "Green Sheet" Missions Projects will be updated and may be found on the Yearly Meeting website. She also stated that Cedar Square is sponsoring a "poor man's supper" and donating all proceeds to Friends Theological College.

Ken Thames reported that the NCYM Ministers Association will meet at Asheboro Friends on Tuesday.

Kevin Smitherman announced that Forbush Friends will have an auction and supper and that Yadkin Quarter will have a four-week study on Quakerism.

A sympathy card will be sent to Leslie Winslow.

Judy Ritter, Clerk, read the following Closing Minute:

Georgia Fuller in the "The Biblical Vision of Peace" said "God's Peaceable Kingdom comes through humble works of justice and mercy". Go from here today not thinking "I can't do anything special". Do ordinary things. Do justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly.

"Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Matthew 25:40

David Hobson closed with prayer.

North Carolina Yearly Meeting Representative Body
Mid-Year Gathering Minutes
Third Month, Fourth Day 2011
Quaker Lake Camp, Climax, North Carolina

Judy Ritter, Clerk of North Carolina Yearly Meeting, welcomed everyone and declared the Representative Body to be in session. She then read the Opening Minute:

“Mid-Year Gathering is to consider the mission work of the Yearly Meeting. Therefore, let us center on our Eighth Query: Do you make diligent effort to acquaint yourselves and those under your care with the spiritual needs of the world? Do you support by prayer and systematic giving those who are laboring to extend Christ’s Kingdom? Do you use your spiritual gifts in serving humanity as God grants you light to see such service?

‘Then Jesus came to them and said, “All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations’ ...” *Matthew 28:18 and 19a*

Michael Blythe, pastor of Thomasville Friends Meeting, gave the devotion. He used Revelation Chapter 18 as the basis of his comments. The fall of Babylon could have many meanings which could apply to our individual lives, the local meetings, or North Carolina Yearly Meeting. Our challenge is to be faithful. He closed with prayer.

The Agenda was **approved**.

Christian Education Commission

Myra Brady brought the following memorial for Angella Beharie, which was read by Brent McKinney:

In December of 2010, we were saddened to learn of the untimely passing of Angella Beharie. Three representatives of North Carolina Yearly Meeting traveled to Dover Friends Meeting in Jamaica to participate in the memorial service and celebration of her life. We shared short messages that spoke to Angella as a dedicated Quaker Pastor of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, a catalyst to pastoral and leadership development, a pillar among Friends, and committed to God’s Kingdom work across the island of Jamaica and throughout the world.

North Carolina Yearly Meeting’s connection with Angella began in 1990 when our Christian Education Committee considered the possibility of offering a Bible School program to children in Jamaica. Loyal to her Christian Education work, Myra Brady made initial contacts to the Jamaica Yearly Meeting office. Angella was the voice answering Myra’s call, which resulted in God’s call to yet another ministry adventure. These two ladies had no idea that they were laying the ground work for the seeds of a new ministry and a friendship that would impact the lives of thousands of children and adults for years to come in Jamaica and North Carolina.

Angella not only sought God’s vision for His Kingdom work; but she was faithful, dependable, and diligent to do her part to accomplish

God's plan. She put things in order and devised a plan to move ahead with God's work. Angella saw the potential and greatest possibilities in individuals and groups of people. She could motivate anyone with her smile, laughter and passion. It was important to her that others were valued and found their place in ministry as she followed up with phone calls, gathered supplies, provided transportation and hospitality for so many. Not only was she generous with her time, efforts and resources, Angella extended a listening ear and open heart to the concerns of others. She was a caregiver to the harvest of people God had sent her way.

Angella Beharie is known worldwide among Friends not only for her accomplishments, but her faithful service to our Quaker truths, testimonies, and way of worship. She traveled a great deal representing Jamaican Friends on FWCC, FUM, USFW, and USFWI Committees and Boards. Angella was present and attentive to the Quaker faith and process and her contributions were always valued.

Twenty years after that initial acquaintance with Angella Beharie, NCYM celebrates our Bible School ministry in Jamaica Yearly Meeting. We praise God for His blessings and our partnership in ministry to build Quaker faith and leadership in Jamaica Yearly Meeting. Angella's efforts of planting seeds through investing time and love in people have proven to be fruitful. The blessings and benefits from her generous heart and attitude to mentor and invest in the lives of so many others will continue to spill over for generations to come. Many Friends in NCYM and across the world of Friends are dedicated to supporting the work that Pastor Beharie began.

The NCYM Christian Education Committee would like to establish a scholarship fund in Angella Beharie's memory. Invitations for contribution will be extended across the world and received for a one-year period. These designated funds would be made available for Jamaicans for the purpose of formal training in leadership and ministry, consistent with Jamaica's Strategic Plan. If the sum total collected is at least \$5,000.00, a named trust will be established.

In remembrance of Angella Beharie, we think of James, the half-brother of Jesus Christ, who challenged Jews and Gentiles alike when he asked, "show me your faith." When no answer came, he answered his own challenge by saying, "I'll show you my faith by what I do." Perhaps a quote from St. Francis of Assissi sums up Angela's life best when all believers are challenged with these words: "In all you do, preach the Gospel ...and if you have to, use words."

We are grateful and yet ever so challenged by the life, faith, ministry, and legacy of Angella Beharie. We now look forward to continuing to honor her and Christ Jesus in the work that lies before us.

He is currently working with Prosperity, Plainfield and South Fork, as these Meetings are seeking pastors. Presently, Billy Britt and youth pastor, Andrew Needham, are sharing the pulpit at South Fork. Hobert Freeman is serving at Mt. View. Ken Spivey will be retiring in June from Plainfield.

The committee will approach other committees, FDS, USFW and Quaker Men to help fund these awards. Meetings and individuals might be approached for designated contributions.

Clerk, Judy Ritter, read the letter from John Porter announcing his intent to leave the position of Superintendent of NCYM on December 31, 2011. He wishes to allow adequate time for an orderly transition of leadership.

Several persons rose to speak of their appreciation of John's dedication and leadership skills. One person suggested that he should not retire but rather become the "designated interim pastor" and give Billy Britt a rest.

Executive Committee

Gwen Headen reported that the Search Committee for Superintendent will consist of the Personnel Committee (Mark Allen, Brent McKinney, Brenda Marshall) and 9 representatives – one from each of the nine Quarters in the Yearly Meeting.

Bill Eagles presented information about certain tax advantages which are not being made available to our retired ministers with their Pension Plan benefits. The following statements come for the IRS tax code:

H-3161. Retired clergy.

A retired member of the clergy is entitled to exclude from income the rental value of a home and a rental allowance for maintenance furnished to him as a compensation for past services."

Rev Rule 63-156, 1963-2 CB 79.

Upon retirement, a clergyman may sever his relationship with his local church and rely upon the general convention of a national religious denomination authorized by representatives of the local churches to make all determinations regarding pensions paid to retired ministers for past services to the local churches. In that event, a portion of his pension designated as a rental allowance and paid by the trustees of the unified pension system of the national organization is excludible from the retired clergyman's gross income."

The recommendation being brought is to designate 100% of the retirement benefit as housing allowance. This would apply to retired recorded ministers. **This designation is to be done every year beginning in 2011 with a disclaimer that this is not a**

recommendation and to check with their tax adviser. (It must be done on an individual basis.)

The Executive Committee asked for approval of this item and Representative Body **approved** it.

Faith and Practice Revisions Committee

Etta Florence Winslow reported that the Publications Board will reprint Faith and Practice. She **is not** asking for approval for that. She cited examples of corrections which need to be made. You may refer to the following pages: 18; 19; 24; 64; 81; 88, 2nd paragraph, last sentence; 96 and 104. Also, on page 38, paragraph 4, line 7, change the word “inculcation” to instill.

These items are to be considered approved.

A discussion arose as to whether the wording in Faith and Practice should be non-gender specific. Examples given were page 29, line 2 and page 27, line 5. David Hobson expressed the thought that this wording could convey a feeling of exclusion. Others shared thoughts that perhaps the wording could indicate a feeling that women were “second class citizens” or not as valuable in God’s sight as men.

One suggestion was made that we could update the language but another person felt strongly that we should not change anything that would change wording in the scripture. The intent is to convey divine relationship which encompasses both genders. No decision was made at this time. **It was approved that this matter should be discussed in monthly meetings and recommendations should be sent to this committee by the end of June and the matter will be considered again at Yearly Meeting.**

Share the Blessing

Deets McCullen reported that the fund is presently \$68,550.00 short of meeting the challenge goal. He stated that more money is needed and that we should continue the annual offerings for this fund. Deets also asked us to consider Share the Blessing when making wills and establishing trust funds. Billy and Viola Britt were thanked for their work. Pledge cards are available.

Structure Evaluation Group

Mike Fulp, Sr. reported that the Spiritual Assessment Survey is available online and on paper. He encouraged anyone who had not already done so to take the survey. He read the Nominating Committee Draft; however, there seemed to be much confusion. After hearing that there would be seven Boards and five Standing Committees, it seemed to some that this would be concentrating too much authority into too few hands. The object is to streamline our committees, having people use their talents or skills to work on tasks for a limited time.

Because of the apparent uncertainty of this draft, it was revised to read as follows:

Nominating Committee (March 5, 2011)

The North Carolina Yearly Meeting Nominating Committee is a Standing Committee to consist of members who are active in local meetings, experienced in Friends’ practices, and committed to the

Christian principles set forth in **Faith and Practice of North Carolina Yearly Meeting. The Nominating Committee** structure comes from all Quarterly Meetings in the Yearly Meeting. Quarterly Meetings will appoint a total of two persons to the Nominating Committee for staggered two-year terms. This would be an eighteen-member committee (nine quarters) and there would be new appointments each year. A person may not serve more than two consecutive terms until being off the committee for a year. The Nominating Committee would nominate to the NCYM Representative Body for approval the names of all members of the seven major Boards, Standing Committees and the NCYM Clerks. The Administrative Council would annually name the Clerk and Assistant Clerk of the Nominating Committee from the membership of those appointed by the quarters.

This was approved.

Ministry and Counsel Report

The following report was submitted by Linda Selleck, Clerk of NCYM Ministry and Counsel:

Our Yearly Meeting Ministry and Counsel met on Saturday, August 7, 2010 at Plainfield Friends Meeting near Siler City, NC with more than 90 Friends present.

Our next Yearly Meeting Ministry and Counsel is scheduled to meet on Saturday, August 6, 2011 at Forsyth Friends Meeting at 800 Jonestown Road in Winston-Salem, NC.

Our Ministry and Counsel Executive Committee met September 14, and also earlier today, March 4, with all our ministry oversight groups represented.

There has been a change in the Chairperson for the Recording Committee. David Brindle found it necessary to resign in January, 2011 since he and his wife, Linda, were moving to Ohio. During the February Recording Committee, Daniel Thames graciously accepted our request to be the new Chairperson for the Recording Committee and Sara Beth Terrell accepted becoming the Assistant Chairperson.

The Recording Committee has hosted two days of recording classes since Yearly Meeting, the last being on Saturday, February 5. More classes will be offered on Saturday, June 11, and the Committee is considering planning an additional day of classes before the June date.

The Recording Committee's largest challenge is finding adequate time to meet with all the many candidates, but they are persevering. Candidates were reminded that they are responsible for contacting Daniel Thames to set up their yearly review appointments with the Committee.

Brady Morrison is the Chairperson of the Spiritual Life Commission this year. The group has been working diligently, and information was sent out months ago to all monthly meetings concerning this year's

Spiritual Condition Report. The deadline for these reports is April 1. The deadline for reports from Quarters is June 1.

The Spiritual Life Commission hosted an excellent day of learning and worship for our Yearly Meeting Pastors and Elders on February 5 at Cane Creek Friends Meeting. The theme was, "Discerning Your Spiritual Gifts", with Ron Selleck and Michael Fulp, Jr. as presenters.

The Spiritual Life Commission is also hosting another Yearly Meeting Revival Service on Friday, June 3, 2011 beginning around 7:00 pm at Hopewell Friends Meeting. Daniel Thames and Jennifer York will be preaching.

The Executive Committee continues to discuss a new process for the structure and work of the Ministry and Counsel Nominating Committee which will be presented at the August 6 meeting. At this time, Eddie Oakley, Clerk of the Deep River Quarter Ministry and Counsel, is gathering the Nominating Committee to make this year's nominating decisions as usual.

Financial Report

Judith Cranford distributed copies of the Treasurer's Report. As of December 2010, 85% of the Askings had been paid. She reported that insurance payments were coming in; and at the end of February, 13% of the budget had been collected. Quaker Lake has recently acquired adjacent land for the sum of \$192,000.00. Presently, we have paid \$46,000.00 of our FUM obligation.

Stewardship and Finance Committee

Jimmy Spaulding, Chairperson, reported that stewardship, "How Your Money Is Spent," DVD's are available and encouraged meetings to use this information to educate local meeting members as to how Askings are used. He said that letters had been sent to meetings concerning their non-payment status and thanked meetings which are sending in the money. A Tax and Retirement Seminar is being planned for pastors.

North Carolina United Society of Friends Women

Mary Anna McCullen, President, presented the following report:

Our program theme for this year is, "See I am doing a New Thing", Isaiah 43:19. Many of us are doing a "new thing" this year as we are serving in a new capacity. As the NCUSFW, our purpose is to work together to carry out the vision that Eliza Armstrong Cox had for our society. I feel good about what NCUSFW is planning to do this year.

* The Eliza Armstrong Cox Fellowship Scholarship applications are still being accepted until March 15, 2011. Applications are on the Yearly Meeting website and must be submitted to Lee Van Hughes, Chairman of the Scholarship Committee by March 15th. In 2010 NCUSFW granted a total amount of \$4,625.00 to 28 NC Friends students to further their education.

* Our Spring Conference will be held on Saturday, May 7, 2011 at Centre Friends Meeting. Centre's USFW will provide lunch and the program will be on the 2010 USFWI Triennial Sessions held in Mombassa, Kenya last summer. The Annual Spring Conference offering will be taken for Quaker Lake.

- * The NCUSFW Annual Gathering will be held on August 27, 2011 at Quaker Lake. Sylvia Graves, retiring General Secretary of FUM, has agreed to come and share with us about her experiences with FUM Global Missions. The Annual Gathering offering will be taken for Friends Center at Guilford College.
- * Brenda McKinney has joined our Executive Committee as Peace and Christian Social Concerns Secretary to complete the term of Donna Terrell who resigned in January. We welcome Brenda and look forward to working with her and the information she brings on these issues.
- * NCUSFW is a strong supporter of MOWA Choctaw, Friends Homes Assistance Fund, Mexico Missions, Friends Disaster Service, Quaker Lake, Friends Center at Guilford, AFSC Friends Humanitarian Response Program and FUM Global Missions. Ron shared Romans 12:1-2 and began thoughts about the definition of Integrity. Integrity is one of the Friends testimonies and we all have a testimony of integrity whether we recognize it or not. Ron's definition of Integrity is wholeness of heart toward God, my neighbor, and myself.

Two visitors representing Baltimore Yearly Meeting were recognized and welcomed.

Superintendent's Report

John Porter gave his final report as Superintendent. He began by recognizing his wife, Mary, who has given him support and encouragement over the years.

Many of the pastoral changes since the last annual session have been the result of death, retirement, or a career move to some other type of work. Currently, there is only one meeting without a pastor. Ken Spivey has retired after 28 years of service and Bob Blake will be leaving Hunting Creek Friends in November.

John Porter's Message to North Carolina Yearly Meeting annual session September 3, 2011:

My journey to NCYM reminds me sometimes about a story I read about a man who had been lost and walking in the desert for about two weeks. One hot day, he saw the home of a missionary. Tired and weak, he crawled up to the house and collapsed on the doorstep. The missionary found him and nursed him back to health. Feeling better, the man asked the missionary for directions to the nearest town. On

his way out the back door, he saw a horse. He went back into the house and asked the missionary, "Could I borrow your horse and give it back when I reach the town?"

The missionary said "Sure but there is a special thing about this horse, you have to say 'Thank God' to make it go, and 'Amen' to make it stop." Not paying much attention, the man said, "Sure, ok."

The man got on the horse and said, "Thank God" and the horse started walking. Then the man said, "Thank God, Thank God," and the horse started to trot. Feeling really brave, the man said, "Thank God, Thank God, Thank God, Thank God, Thank God" and the horse just took off. Pretty soon the man saw a cliff coming up and he did everything he could to make the horse stop. "Whoa, stop, hold on!!!!"

Finally he remembered, "Amen", he shouted!! The horse stopped about 4 inches from the cliff. Then the man leaned back in the saddle and said "Thank God." Sometimes I do not know whether to say "Thank God" or "Amen".

This is the fifteenth and last opportunity as Superintendent that I have to address this body at the annual sessions of North Carolina Yearly Meeting. It has been my high honor as a servant of God to be a part of the Kingdom work here in NC. Someone suggested to me recently that I not get up here and share the pain and hurt that comes to whomever holds this position, and I shall not. Has there been pain, yes. Has there been disappointment, yes; but as I stated in my letter to you when God released me from this task: my overwhelming reflection has been one of thanksgiving and joy.

I count it a joy and am deeply grateful for the ones that were instrumental in my coming here. There was the first personnel committee meeting with Don Osborne, Jack Kirk and Pike Johnson. These Godly men saw something in my qualities that enabled them to proceed with a recommendation to go forward.

I have been blessed to serve with some of the finest individuals that I have known, who have served as your clerks. They are Clifford Winslow, Brent McKinney, Mike Fulp, and now Judy Ritter. I haven't always agreed with each decision and action that has been taken. I suspect that this may be a two-way street for these fine individuals; but I have always respected and admired each of them. I am proud to call each one my friend.

I have had the privilege to serve with many dedicated people who have had the work of God foremost in their minds and the growth and well-being of the Yearly Meeting as their guide. There have been the chairpersons of the executive committee, the clerks and chairs of the many other boards, commissions, committees, groups, associations and gatherings who have faithfully, formally and informally, served on your behalf and for God in their work and in their walk. There are far too many to name individually.

In the past fifteen years, there have been at least 87 men and women who have been pastors in the Yearly Meeting who are not serving now. There are probably more than that. I have tried to keep a count; but almost surely, I have not been one-hundred percent accurate. Some of them passed on to be with God. Others left for reasons not of their own desires. Some have left to pursue other work. Others have gone to serve other churches or in other denominations. I can say that I have been blessed to know these pastors and many of them I miss greatly.

I am blessed to know those pastors who continue to serve. Obviously, many of them are new to the yearly meeting and some are new to pastoral ministry. I count each of these men and women my friends and I have been blessed to know them. Many will continue to be friends of mine in the years to come.

I want to personally thank the past and present staff that have served and are serving you in the capacity of persons released by you to do the work that you ask of us. This is an amazing group of individuals. Much of what is done is not seen by you and you do not recognize. Brenda Inman, who is clerk of Concord Friends Meeting and retired from working in the court system in NC for many years, started working in our office on a part-time basis several years ago. She came to me one day and stated, "I didn't know how much work is done by the staff in the office for the Yearly Meeting." You will get to welcome and recognize most of the current Yearly Meeting staff in just a little while, when they are introduced to you.

I would be remiss if I did not say a word of thanks about those of you who are here today and many more faithful individuals who work to make this Yearly Meeting a stronger and better instrument for the work that God has called us to do in our little corner of the world. Without you and those in your Meetings that work for the Meeting and for those who serve in some capacity at the Yearly Meeting, much of the work that we do simply wouldn't get done; and I thank you. I am blessed to have had the opportunity to serve here with you.

Finally, I also want to recognize Mary, my faithful wife of just over 43 years, who is with us today and is helping to care for our youngest grandchild, André, who is visiting with us for a few days from Boulder, CO. Mary and I have three adult children and five grandchildren. They, each in their own way, have been supportive for the work that God called Mary and me to fifteen years ago. She says that I often neglect to mention her (and I do), so I wanted to be sure and do that today. I am looking forward to having more time to spend with her as we both step back from the rigors of full-time jobs.

Someone on our staff spoke to me earlier this summer and remarked: our Yearly Meeting is in a different world than it was fifteen years ago. It certainly is a different world. You can name many things that are different in your lives than they were fifteen years ago. Travel

is perhaps the most noticeable difference, including gas prices. Six years ago, we gathered here just as Katrina was wrecking havoc in the Gulf States area. Some were not able to attend because gasoline spiked to over \$3.00 per gallon. Many of our men and women have made numerous trips to that area to offer assistance to the myriad households that were destroyed or damaged. Our Yearly Meeting was larger then in some ways and, in some ways, floundering as we sought to find our way as Christ followers.

It is not my intention today to list all of the changes that we have seen, things that have been accomplished for God in these past years, and what has happened. I do not consider that what I have done as Superintendent has been the driving force for the good changes we have observed. There has been the awesome hand of a great and powerful God and His still small voice that people have heard and responded to obediently. It has been the Spirit working which we have observed. Today is not about the past; however, it is about the future of NCYM and the people called to be workers in the fields of harvest that are set before us.

One of the things that the Spiritual Life Commission asks our Meetings to do each year is to reflect on the past and to help plan for the future, the SWOT or Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats represented in that acronym. I want to share very briefly what I observe as an outgoing superintendent to be some of those attributes for us to observe and learn from.

- ◆ *Visioning and Vision statement: North Carolina Yearly Meeting of Friends is a faithful, passionate, growing community of Christ-followers, drawn together by God's love and truth as continually revealed through the Saving Grace and the Light of Jesus Christ and the Holy Scriptures. As Quakers, we seek God's leading, serve God's purpose, and go as God's people into the world to love, reconcile and transform through the power of the Holy Spirit.*
- ◆ Quaker Lake—facilities, programs
- ◆ Intern program
- ◆ Friends Disaster Service (as Millard Fuller, founder of Habitat for Humanity calls people like these—persons who minister with the theology of the hammer)
- ◆ Pastoral leadership improving with training and dedication
- ◆ Staff
- ◆ Structure change (Structure Evaluation Group)

- ◆ Dedicated workers in the Yearly Meeting who donate myriad hours and many dollars for all of our work much as a personal sacrifice of time and resources

- ◆ Many strong Meetings

- ◆ Increased level of trained dedicated candidates for pastoral calls

OPPORTUNITIES

- ◆ Young adult ministries (62 Young Adults registered for Yearly Meeting Annual Sessions)

- ◆ Young friends ministries (146 registered for YFYM—25 registered for JrYM)

- ◆ Intolerance by well-intentioned persons both from the theologically conservative and theologically liberal

- ◆ Aging membership

- ◆ Conflict within Meetings that has not and will not be addressed

- ◆ Members and Meetings that work to undermine the good things that are happening

- ◆ Persons who are enlisting like-minded people to serve out of their theological base rather than those who are Spirit filled

One of the questions that has been laid on my heart and mind for several years is the question of what does God call us when He calls us by name. We will talk about this a bit more in a little while.

In Gen. 32:24-32 we read about Jacob wrestling with a man.

²⁴ So Jacob was left alone, and a man wrestled with him till daybreak.

²⁵ When the man saw that he could not overpower him, he touched the socket of Jacob's hip so that his hip was wrenched as he wrestled with the man.

²⁶ Then the man said, "Let me go, for it is daybreak." But Jacob replied, "I will not let you go unless you bless me."

²⁷ The man asked him, "What is your name?" "Jacob," he answered.

²⁸ Then the man said, "Your name will no longer be Jacob, but Israel, ^[a] because you have struggled with God and with humans and have overcome."

²⁹ Jacob said, "Please tell me your name." But he replied, "Why do you ask my name?" Then he blessed him there.

³⁰ So Jacob called the place Peniel, ^[b] saying, "It is because I saw God face to face, and yet my life was spared."

³¹ The sun rose above him as he passed Peniel, ^[c] and he was limping because of his hip.

³² Therefore to this day the Israelites do not eat the tendon attached to the socket of the hip, because the socket of Jacob's hip was touched near the tendon. (NIV)

The focus in this passage is on Jacob – a character in his own right – a man who had conspired with his mother against his father and stolen the birthright of his father from his own brother Esau. Jacob was on his way to reconcile with his brother. Jacob had sent on before him 200 female goats, 20 rams, 200 sheep, and 20 rams; 30 female camels and their young; 40 cows and 10 bulls; 20 female donkeys and 10 male donkeys.

But, Jacob remained behind on the edge of the river with his family and the remainder of his possessions. Later, he sent them across the stream; but he remained alone with his past, his fears, and his dreams. There comes a time in each of our lives when we cannot be comforted by our possessions or distracted by the things around us and we are completely alone, by ourselves. For some this is a dreadful time. And then the demons come. The decisions, the plans, the fear, the worry, the responsibility, the confusion, the past, the resentment, and the future—all gang up on us—and we cannot escape. For Jacob it was a time of wrestling with a "man" that can only be identified as God. Jacob had struggled all of his life to prevail—first with Esau, then his father, then with Laban (his uncle and his father-in-law) and now as he prepared to reenter Canaan he learned that it was God with whom he must wrestle. Jacob spent the night struggling with the voice, muscle, strength, and mystery of God. It is here in the midst of life, in the midst of the most important event of his life that Jacob participated in the wrestling match. A painful and magnificent conflict and dialogue with God consumed Jacob's time, his mind, his body, and his soul. This was the moment of Divine

encounter, the moment when man's will confronts God's will—the crossroads in the life of Jacob, the struggle for blessing and the event that changed his life for eternity. It was a time of honest answers between man and God.

We all have those times in our lives. How we deal with our struggles with God answers how we live our life and how we spend eternity. We may be at that place in NCYM.

I. The foremost lesson from this text to us is that God is met in the midst of events, not just in the remote quiet areas of reflection in our minds. The problem that Jacob faced in getting a group of family, animals, and servants to move in a caravan across the Jabbok, coupled with the problem he faced in this uncertain reunion with his brother, Esau, were the sum and substance of Jacob's life.

(a) God, whose coming we cannot stop, comes in the midst of events, in the midst of our history, our personal history and our corporate history, our public history and our private history.

II. The blessing that we receive in a struggle with God comes only as it did with Jacob when we answer the crucial question, that probing, central, fearful question of all our days, "What is your name?" or "Who are you?" We cannot answer with pretense of deception. Jesus, in Matthew 16:15, asked "But what about you? Who do you say I am?" "What is your name?"

In medieval history someone might say, "I am William, John's son." That person would have been William Johnson. Our name says a lot about us. In some instances it can be a history of the public perception of us.

Some days during the week I am called by my professional name. It used to be Judge or sometimes your honor. Now it is usually just John or Mr. Porter. Sometimes, by persons from outside Friends' circles, it is Dr. Porter and even, on a few occasions by some additionally enlightened persons, as Reverend Porter.

Sometimes when people mispronounce my name or refer to me in some informal way, I bristle a bit and say to myself, I am not that person, I am John Porter. But am I? In reality, however, I wonder what or should I say: "Who I really am?"

God doesn't know me just as 'John' or as Superintendent Porter, or as a Mr. or a Dr. or a Rev., or even as a husband to Mary, or a father to my children, or grandfather to my grandchildren. God knows me as who I am, what I am and what I am becoming. God knows me as my inner self, my true being and that's what he calls me as he seeks me and as he speaks to me.

(a) When Jacob answered God's query, "What is your name?" he said "Jacob". He did not reveal only the "handle" that was given to him by his father at his birth and the name that he was called in his daily life, but he revealed his inner character, his soul, and his person. He gave away the essence of his whole personality

for his name was more, much more than that by which we respond. Jacob could well have responded to God: "I am a deceiver of my father, a robber of my brother, a proud man and an arrogant man—that is me!" These were facts and the pretense would be swept away. God knows these things about us; but, He has to hear from us that we know, and we admit it.

- (b) It is the uncovering, the honesty about self, not proclaimed and paraded before the world, but honesty with God and with self that the encounters with God demand. Many of us want to live in the deceptive, and avoid answering the question God puts to North Carolina Yearly Meeting—what is your name? This, however, is the substance of the crisis of life! The Divine question and no blessing until the brave answer is made. In John 21:15 Jesus is speaking to the disciples and asks the Question, "Do you love me more than these?"
- III. God can only help us as men and women, and as a denomination or a religious society, or a Yearly Meeting to dance when we do not cover up the dance.
 - (a) The fullness of human life comes within the limitations, and by accepting them, and not denying them. For the God who moves in and through us by the events of our days and in our history as a people, is a God of truth; and He has no ability to deal with our pretenses or distortions. So, when we cannot, or do not, face and confess the bad as well as the good, the false as well as the true, the weak as well as the strong, we keep part of life forever beyond God's redemptive love by our sheer willfulness; and we can never really dance. We then only dream and sigh for a life that is not to be, and miss the one that is.
 - (b) So Jacob's wrestling match at the river crossing reminds us that our own encounter with God is in and through the events of our days and the history of which we are a part.
 - (c) The crisis moment in that match comes in the demand, "What is your name?" and in that opportunity to confess our whole nature, good and bad, and to drop all sham and pretense between ourselves and God.
 - (d) Now, in this matter of the injury to Jacob's thigh and the limp he carried the rest of his days, the point is that one cannot really dance, as a child of God, unless the person limps; because, we are human and not God. Our limping is a sign of our human limitations and a sign of the hope in which we live, a dawn toward which we walk. And, as Jacob passed Peniel, limping, the sun rose and the dawn came.

As we think about what name God has called us, I would like us to reflect on our Yearly Meeting theme of integrity.

Our theme this year is about a Quaker testimony on integrity. I suggested this topic to the program committee as a potential followup to the theme last year of peace. What I hope is that we could have a series of Yearly Meetings on other Quaker testimonies. There are many. To most of them, we simply give lip service. We love to talk about our Quaker testimonies, but do we practice them with integrity?

Will Cooper in his Pendle Hill pamphlet on The Testimony of Integrity in the RSOF writes: The Testimony of Integrity can be articulated and practiced by Friends in four distinct ways.

- The first is truth telling, or simply not telling lies. This is the most obvious place to begin to live out the Testimony of Integrity. Friends have always been known for truthfulness and honesty in their relationships and dealings with others. This standard of truthfulness was grounded in Jesus' and James' biblical injunction not to take an oath or to swear that one will tell the truth (Matthew 5:33-37; James 5:12). Friends were very conscientious about this, not only because the Scriptures forbade taking oaths and swearing; but, also because it implied a double standard of truth, thus suggesting that when not under oath, it is all right to lie. Friends' concern was that followers of Christ should be known for telling the truth all the time, and not just when one was called before a judge and sworn to tell the truth. The Testimony of Integrity calls for truth-telling under all circumstances—and at all times.
- Secondly, Cooper writes: Integrity calls for authenticity, for genuineness, and for veracity in one's personhood. It calls us to be truly who we are, and not be two-faced by trying to be something, or somebody, we are not. The opposite of integrity, of course, is hypocrisy, which means phoniness, sham and deception. Jesus has some scathing words for hypocrites in Matthew 23. He declares seven woes against the religious authorities of his time, the Scribes and Pharisees, who were hypocrites and pretenders of virtue and piety. We are all tempted to become pretenders in this way. The tendency to misrepresent our true selves is a common shortcoming we all have. We do not always realize that we are violating our integrity every time we respond this way.
- Thirdly, Cooper continues: Integrity calls, for obedience, or if you prefer, faithfulness to conscience illuminated by the Light of Christ Within. For Quakers, this is the seat of religious authority and, therefore, the touchstone of our faith.
- Fourthly, the root meaning of the word "integrity" calls for wholeness. The word "integrity" and the mathematical term "integer" all have a common meaning. When we look at this common meaning of integrity, it points to a unity, which when applied to persons, we call community. Integrity creates a sense of togetherness and belonging, when applied to persons in community. Integrity forms the basis for a covenant relationship in which persons

exercise a sense of responsibility and accountability toward one another. Individualism, which is preoccupied with doing one's own thing, often with little concern for how it affects other people, dominates much of our behavior in western society, and in our American culture, in particular. It affects the Religious Society of Friends as well. Thus, we need to recover the Testimony of Integrity, to balance this other attitude when applied to wholeness in the corporate life of persons, where there is a sense of responsibility and accountability toward one another.

Conclusion:

As we reflect on the scripture lesson and look at it through the prism of integrity, I believe that God was wrestling with Jacob, and in the process, giving him a new name. Names. We all have them, but what do they mean to us? What do they mean to others in our communities and in the world? What does our name mean to God?

If you're in a room and someone says your name then your body will probably make an automatic reaction. Scripture tells us that God calls us by name. So, is there something more to a name than it being something convenient to call someone? Is there something important in the meaning?

We see people in the Bible naming their children after a circumstance or situation, or as a prophetic sign of what they are to become. God calls us by name, but maybe it's a name different to our earthly one. I believe He had a pet name for us even when we were in our mother's womb. What is God's pet name for you? Perhaps, we should ask Him today. It might reveal to us something of our identity. What is the name that God calls each one of us? Is it John, or Jane, or Robert, or Sandra, or another name? Or, has God given you a new name that is known only to him and to you? Maybe it is care giver, or nurturer, or empowerer, or maybe it is merely friend.

By what name shall God call North Carolina Yearly Meeting? Is it a name that we would want to be known by? Maybe it is "partner". Maybe it is "bringer of hope to the wounded in spirit", or "replacer of the loss of one's house". Maybe it is "missionary" or "evangelist". Maybe it is a "beloved Community of believers" that love one another. Maybe it is "those who know Christ and make Christ known". Above all, is it a name that honors our Master and our Savior, the Living Christ?

My prayer is that God will give North Carolina Yearly Meeting a new name, one that is known to him and that we will make his name known in the world and our communities by the lives we lead and the integrity with which we minister.

Mary and I thank you, from the bottom of our hearts, that you have invited us to travel with you thus far on NCYM's journey and that God has allowed our paths to be together for this short time. God bless you as He gives guidance and direction. May we all be faithful!

Clerk, Judy Ritter, announced that the next Representative Body will be held on the first Saturday in November at Centre Friends.

Following the Superintendent's Report the staff members were introduced: Darlene Pittman, Darrin Allen, Janice Dalton, Judith Cranford, Paul Routh, Heather Varner, Andrew Williams, Sarah Vestal, and Tim and Ann Kendall. Several brief reports were given and a PowerPoint/DVD allowed us to see their work in action. (Please refer to the program booklet to read the full, written reports.)

Young Adult Ministry: This ministry is very strong with 60 or more 18-35 year olds attending this year.

Friends Campus Ministry is growing every year. This year there are five locations at colleges across the state: UNC-Greensboro, NC State, Western Carolina, Charlotte and Campbell. Local meetings are asked to send names and addresses of their college students so that contact may be made.

MOWA-Choctaw Friends Center: Ann Kendall gave a moving account of several persons and their circumstances in the MOWA community. Each case was different, but it was apparent that God is working through the Kendall's to change lives. There are numerous ways in which individuals and meetings can contribute to the success of this mission.

Jamaica VBS: Myra Brady and Brenda McKinney invited everyone to attend a birthday party celebrating 20 years of Bible School in Jamaica. The date is October 8, 2011 from 3:00-5:00 p.m. Come join the fun at the Yearly Meeting Annex.

Quaker Lake: Heather Varner used a DVD to illustrate just how beautiful Quaker Lake is and how much pleasure it brings to young campers and adults alike. She thanked everyone who had worked hard over the years to provide this beautiful resource. Heather reminded us of the Pumpkin Festival on October 22nd.

Friends Committee on National Legislation: Dot Mason spoke of the retirement of Joe Volk, who served faithfully for many years. Diane Randall is the new director and needs our support. Dot expressed gratitude to those in North Carolina who work within NCYM to support FCNL and influence public policy. Jesus addressed the social issues of his time, and we should do our part today.

Following the reading of this report by Brady Morrison, a question arose about some statements that seemed to imply that many of our time-honored traditions/testimonies were no longer applicable and should be reconsidered.

After further exploration, Clerk did share that the Minute of Advice for Ministry and Counsel did need this Body's approval. **The report was approved.**

Linda Selleck reported that four candidates are being recommended for recording this year: Sarah Vestal, Richard Wilcox, Georgianne Satterfield and Jennifer York. **These four names were approved.** The name of Debbie Parvin, who was recommended to be discontinued for recording, was put on hold.

Jake Penley closed the session with prayer.

**Afternoon Worship and Business - Washburn Center
Saturday, September 3, 2011**

Guilford College Friends Center: Max Carter, Director of Friends Center, stated that Guilford is in the top 10% of colleges in the United States. It provides an opportunity for an excellent education. Through the Quaker Leaders Scholarship Program, Quaker students from several Yearly Meetings are provided an opportunity to fellowship, learn from each other, and grow spiritually.

Max introduced the new intern, Nathan Sebens, a graduate of Guilford College and Earlham School of Religion. He will be working with the QLSP, doing administrative work and “doing whatever Max tells him to do”.

The brochures for this fall's Quaker Renewal Program are on the display table. As always, the speakers this year are excellent.

Executive Committee Report: Gwen Headen reported that John Porter's resignation becomes effective on 12/31/11. Interviews with candidates were held by the search committee and Randy Quate was recommended to fill the position of NCYM Superintendent, subject to approval by this body.

Gwen described the “tough” questions which were asked of Randy. He answered the questions to the committee's satisfaction. Randy was introduced by Bill Eagles and given an opportunity to make statements and give his views of how he would lead the Yearly Meeting, if given the opportunity.

The floor was opened for members to ask Randy serious, thought-provoking questions. How would you address financial challenges of NCYM? Do you see potential of re-establishing Guilford College as a resource?

How do we move forward following the Ministry and Counsel meeting on August 6th when so many came away sad and discouraged? How do we speak to **all** NCYM Friends? (Concern was expressed about some of the language in the Minute of Advice in regard to maintaining basic testimonies.)

Randy was excused following his answers to these questions.

Consideration of the recommendation: Individuals representing 29 monthly meetings voiced their support of the recommendation. Clerk, Judy Ritter, stated that it appeared to be the sense of the meeting to call Randy Quate as our next superintendent. **He was approved.**

Following the approval of Randy Quate as the next Superintendent of North Carolina Yearly Meeting, Clerk Judy Ritter asked Randy for remarks. Randy thanked everyone for the vote of confidence. He said that his family will be at the next Yearly Meeting function to meet everyone. He commended John Porter and asked that the “tremendous job” John Porter has done be minuted. Special prayer for Randy as he enters this new ministry was led by Hugh Spaulding.

Treasurer's Report: Martha Jo Jones gave the Treasurer's Report. She said that 67% of Askings should be paid at this point, but as of August 31st, only 55% have been paid. Thirty-five meetings are paid to date, and two are paid in full. She asked that we encourage payment of Askings at our meetings.

Friends Emergency Material Assistance Program: Peggie Baxter reported that after 94 years, American Friends Service Committee has laid down the humanitarian assistance program known as EMAP. Some concerned Friends asked AFSC for permission to use the name EMAP with a slight variation. Permission was granted. Friends Emergency Assistance Program (FEMAP) has been created. Springfield Friends has given permission for the use of the Allen Jay House for its headquarters. FEMAP is registered with the NC Secretary of State. Filing for non-profit status will soon take place. This will be an all-volunteer organization. Our financial and material support will be needed. Peggie encouraged us to get on the mailing list and to inform our meetings of the need for support. Peggie also reported that NCUSFW has added FEMAP to their Green Sheet 2012 budget.

Friends Disaster Service: Wiley Shore reported that Friends Disaster Service will be going to Vanceboro, NC, on September 18th to work on a house and put flooring in several others. On October 16th, a trip is planned to Bertie County to build a house. Wiley also reported that help and supplies are desperately needed on the Outer Banks because of Hurricane Irene. They will try to get money and supplies to help.

Mike Fulp reported that a golf tournament will be held on October 7th to benefit Friends Disaster Service. Nineteen more teams are needed. Fifty thousand dollars are needed to build a house.

Faith and Practice Revisions: The next item of business was consideration of the proposed corrections and revisions to the 2004 edition of Faith and Practice, North Carolina Yearly Meeting as recommended to and approved by Representative Body 3/5/2011. The purpose of these revisions is to update our Faith and Practice before another printing is made.

Clerk reviewed each of the changes and asked for approval on each item separately:

Page 18 – First line correct spelling of Condemned.

Meeting approved.

Page 18 and 19 – Update the yearly meetings and use correct names

Meeting approved.

Page 21 – Update NCYM statistics relating to number of meetings and membership with the latest data. **Meeting approved.**

Page 24 – Update places FUM Triennial sessions have been held:
2005, Des Moines, IA; 2008, High Point, NC; 2011,
Wilmington, OH

Page 64 – Annual Audit – 5. **(Now reads)** The monthly meetings shall appoint an auditing committee which shall be responsible for

an annual audit of the accounts of the meeting.

RECOMMEND changing to read: 5. The monthly meeting shall appoint an auditing committee which shall be responsible for an annual audit of the meeting accounts, including but not limited to the general account, building fund account, missions account, endowment accounts, trust accounts, cemetery accounts, memorial accounts, and youth accounts. **Meeting approved.**

Chapter 3 – Quarterly Meeting – Organization and Functions, Page 88, paragraph 2, Officers and Committees in the 2004 edition the last sentence reads: “The quarterly meeting shall in all cases act only in accordance with the express will of the quarterly meeting except emergencies.” In the 1999 printing the last sentence for Officers and Committees reads: “Where the financial responsibility of the quarterly meeting is involved, and in other matters, the trustees should, except in emergencies, act only in accordance with the express will of the quarterly meeting.” **RECOMMEND** using the sentence from the 1999 printing and delete the sentence from 2004 edition. **Meeting approved.**

Page 106 – Time of Holding Yearly Meeting. **RECOMMEND** removing this section as Page 92, paragraph 4, entitled “Time of Holding Yearly Meeting” and Page 104 paragraph 5, Time of Meeting speaks of Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Counsel. Those two references cover the information on Page 106. **Meeting approved.**

Page 96 #b – board should be plural. **Meeting approved.**

Page 96 #f – It currently reads: “Yearly meeting trustees of yearly meeting relative to signing deeds, mortgages, and other legal documents.” **RECOMMEND** rewording f and add a new g and the g on Page 96 becomes h–
f. General oversight of all land, properties, estates and charitable donations in cooperation with the yearly meeting trustees and/or the trustees of the trust funds.
g. Giving direction to the trustees of the yearly meeting relative to signing deeds, mortgages and other legal documents. **Meeting approved.**

Page 104 – Committee on Training and Recording needs updating to match the size of the committee as approved by NCYM for 12 members. **RECOMMEND** the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Counsel shall appoint a standing committee on the Training and Recording of ministers, composed of 12 members, at least one-half of whom shall be other than recorded ministers. Appointments shall be made for 3 years, the terms of four expiring each year. **Approved.**

In addition to these approvals, meeting approved asking the Faith and Practice Revision Committee to consider in future work the concern regarding the make-up of the Recording Committee. Becké Jones had expressed a concern from First Friends that there be at least one female on the Recording Committee.

Rausie Hobson, Chairperson of the Publications Board, asked who would supply the updated statistics. Clerk Judy Ritter said that she would supply the statistics.

As the afternoon business session was completed, we adjourned to attend workshops which were held in the Blue Ridge Center.

Interest Groups/Workshops

Cheap Communication: Problems with Quick 'N Easy Technology
Presenters: Kelly and Kathy Kellum. In the easy, quick world of communication via technology, it is easy to become scattered, disconnected and hurtful as we try to stay more connected. This workshop explored the dynamics of this "brave new world" and gave tips and suggestions to integrate technology into our communication and connections with one another.

Financial Integrity: Doing the Right Thing When No One Is Looking – Presenter: Jimmy Spaulding. A round table discussion of financial integrity questions that we face today. Topics included: Cheating on your taxes (politicians do it); Under water mortgages - should you walk away?; Quaker history related to department stores and banking; Tithing; Social Security; What does the Bible say? and more.

Integrity for a New Generation – Raised awareness of the issues facing our young adults today.

Integrity in Education – Presenter: David Girardi, Head of High Point Friends School. Education is a ministry. Education is a covenant relationship between the teacher and the student. The Lord loves righteousness and justice.

12 Myths About Funerals – Presenters: David Bills, Pastor of New Garden Friends and Bill Eagles, Attorney. David examined how we make decisions in the most difficult of times with integrity, decisions that reflect our values and responsibilities. Bill led an examination of integrity in decisions about disposition of our worldly goods upon our death.

Evening Worship and Business - Washburn Center
Saturday, September 3, 2011

Hugh Spaulding announced the winners of the Peace Essay Contest sponsored by the Peace and Social Issues Committee:

College Category – 1st place: Pete Jarvis

2nd place: Jessica Smith

Ron Bryan continued with his text from Romans 12:1-2 and spoke of the transformation in Christ revealing itself by what one thinks and says. He directed us to a 1687 sermon by Quaker Stephen Crisp for an exhortation to seek a personal, immediate experience of revelation. He pointed out that early Friends would place their personal experiences and character before their hearers as evidence of the working of the Inward Light in their lives.

What we think and say is on display and is our living testimony. If we are to live with integrity, our lives will display what is within; we will live and speak with sincerity, openness, and an awareness that others are observing what we say we believe. He quoted James 3:6-12, including, “Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers, this should not be.” George Fox stated, “Our lives will declare the glory of God and demonstrate our faith to the world by our deeds and by our mouth.”

When we fail, God’s love and the Spirit constrain us to make amends. So, we should take care in thought and word. Turning again to Crisp, Ron exhorted us to act with integrity, knowing our vision and purpose, and to be awake to God’s voice. Being God’s child will yield that visible transformation.

Bible Study - Washburn Center
Sunday, September 4, 2011 – 9:00 a.m.

Lisa Lundeen Nagel, in her Bible study of John 1:1-18, used visual aids and invited audience participation to present her message. Beginning with a reader’s theater of Hebrew theologians and Greek philosophers exploring uses for “word,” Lisa demonstrated how John draws on historical meanings to proclaim a new revelation of the Word Incarnate in Jesus Christ. Lisa claimed that integration is the cornerstone of our faith, as the Incarnation pulls together—integrates—God’s life with ours.

Inviting responses from those present, Lisa asked why we do Bible study, what we might be seeking when we go to Scripture, and then reflecting back the many different responses. She introduced Walter Brueggemann’s concept of the “thickness” of Scripture, of its many layers, textures and meanings as it relates God’s relationship with people over generations and generations. She spoke of the intertextuality or

deep connectedness of Scripture that is manifest in rich ways as we come to know pieces of the mind of God.

Reading John 1:1-18 and then re-reading verses 14-18, Lisa spoke with awe to think that the *logos*—God’s word organizing order out of chaos—became human with all the messiness involved in being flesh. How amazing to claim that the Word could or would take on such a humble form and literally “tent” or dwell among us. She continued by exploring some of the key words in the passage, helping us to see more and more clearly the radical nature of John’s claims about the Word made flesh.

But, “so what?” she asked. What does this all mean for *us today*? Lisa requested that people turn to a neighbor and share what it means for us that Jesus is incarnate. Scripture is a conversation into which we invite other voices and prayer partners, perhaps even those whose stories let us know we have planks in our own eyes.

Lisa ended with a reading from Barbara Brown Taylor’s *An Altar in the World*, using a selection from “The Practice of Wearing Skin.” The passage makes clear how much God loves flesh and blood no matter what size or shape or ability. Our bodies connect us to all others and to the world. We need to honor the bodies of our neighbors as well as honoring our own bodies. Jesus’ ministry was about encountering those in bodies discounted by the world and what can happen when we meet people where they are.

Sunday, September 4, 2011 – 10:00 a.m.**

Linda Selleck played a musical prelude followed by a congregational singing of the hymn, “*My Faith Looks Up to Thee*”. James Parker, Pastor of Westfield Friends in Northwest Quarter, led a call to worship. In a time of remembrance, the names of those Friends who have passed away since our last yearly meeting were read by Janie Parker and Karen Freeman. “*Look for Me at Jesus’ Feet*” was sung by soloist, Karen Freeman, with a time of open worship following. The service closed with a benediction by James Parker.

Dan Moran of Deep River Quarter prepared and read the summary of Epistles:

2011 Summary of Epistles

Greetings have been received from twenty-six yearly meetings and associations from around the globe. Some have been gathered for over 300 years such as we have, some have only recently begun. The gatherings have been both small and large by Quaker standards. Some were praising growth while others lamented their decline. The collection of epistles which are on file at the Yearly Meeting office creates a tapestry of the wider body of Friends and connects us with them so that we can feel their joy and understand their sadness. As written by Netherlands Yearly Meeting, the epistles received "...have strengthened our sense of being connected to Friends from all over the world who all of them, living in a wide diversity of cultures and contexts, seek to be the salt of the earth. It is encouraging to us to know that we are not alone in our endeavors."

If these epistles from these various yearly meetings are any indication, Friends around the world are hard at work discerning God's call to minister to the world and becoming agents of God's kingdom work in their local communities. More than one yearly meeting has as its theme some aspect related to the kingdom of God or a challenge directly related to serving in God's kingdom. Jamaica Yearly Meeting's theme was "Living the Kingdom of God in a Broken World" while Nairobi Yearly Meeting's theme was, "Investing in God's Kingdom." Although the themes from the other yearly meetings might not have used the phrase "Kingdom of God", it was clear that they possessed a strong desire to see God's healing, reconciliation, and power be manifested through the work of Friends.

To that end, many of the yearly meetings shared about their desire – and challenge – to live out the witness and testimony of Friends in the world. Northern Yearly Meeting had as its theme "Let Your Life Speak" while other yearly meetings spoke openly about the issues they felt needed to be addressed. New England Yearly Meeting spoke about the challenge to "...break free from fear and old habits, from the arrogance and materialism of our culture." Intermountain

Yearly Meeting had as their theme, “Confronting Racism: The Heart Work Within” and were challenged to reflect on “...experiences of honoring and dishonoring others across boundaries of race and culture.” Illinois Yearly Meeting also sought to address the issue of racism. During their sessions, many generations combined to make a large workshop entitled, “Engaging in a Conversation on Racism”. Baltimore Yearly Meeting also focused on the issue of racism and felt challenged to consider their own prejudices and actions as a Yearly Meeting. Beyond the issue of racism, other yearly meetings addressed issues of creation care, peace, and integrity. In all, each yearly meeting sincerely explored as to how they could “let their lives speak” and make their witness evident.

Difficulties reaching unity were noted by some yearly meetings as they struggled to address uplifted concerns of same-sex relationships and immigration. These groups were challenged to seek communality and find ways to disagree on difficult issues with love and mutual respect. As noted by Indiana Yearly Meeting, “Such discussion is fraught with difficulty, but we concluded that it was rightly ordered.” Financial difficulties were experienced all around, leading some groups to staff reductions and program eliminations. The pain is so deep at Philadelphia Yearly Meeting that they stated, “We long to be released from our burdens, to do the crucial work that we are already called to. We ask ourselves: Do we want to be custodians of things that do not serve our fundamental purposes? We were offered a biological metaphor. During the life of the caterpillar, there appear ‘imaginable’ cells within its body that push the formation of a chrysalis. At first these cells are destroyed by its immune system, but eventually become so numerous that the caterpillar must die, and its body becomes a biological soup to feed the formation into a butterfly. And they conclude, “Are we ready to die in order to be reborn?”

All yearly meetings celebrate the experience of intergenerational worship as all the epistles spoke excitedly about their children, youth, and young adult programs. Clearly, they value the passing on of the faith to the younger generations and see their involvement in yearly meeting as important. Northern Yearly Meeting summed up this experience when they wrote: “We are blessed with generous talent and enthusiasm in our children and youth leadership. Friends at the session also reported a lovely spirit among younger Friends, as evidenced by adolescents inviting grownup acquaintances to join them at dinner, or big kids frequently throwing the Frisbee to little kids in a mixed-age game of ultimate Frisbee.” Often the interaction between generations was also during times of worship as well as sharing groups. In all facets, the value of intergenerational sharing is evident and Friends recognize the need to build bridges with the younger generations and nurture their spiritual journeys as well as their leadership callings.

While some yearly meetings sought the Divine in times of silent worship and unprogrammed experiences, some yearly meetings took on a more revival feel. Bware Yearly Meeting met under theme, “Stand Firm and Hold the Teaching”, taken from 2 Thessalonians 2:15. Tuloi Yearly Meeting met under the theme, “A Time for Revival”, and issued a call for “Restoration of God’s Glory in the Friends Church.” As Tuloi writes in their epistle, “Repentance is the only way to the restoration of God’s glory in the Universal Quaker Church. We need total spiritual transformation to realize a truly peaceable Friends Church.” Even with this focus, Friends in Africa see it as the pathway to greater social influence and peace in the world.

All the epistles expressed a longing for spiritual transformation among Friends that resulted in expressions of faithful acts of service that alleviate suffering and bring peace and wholeness to a broken world. As Ireland Yearly Meeting so eloquently states it, “We are called to be Friends, showing the mark of Christ as we go about our daily lives.” These epistles from other Friends remind us that God is certainly at work among Friends and that the world needs what Quakers have to offer. We may be small in number but we can be large in love and compassion as we seek to live out the gifts God has given us in service to God’s kingdom and seeking to see God’s dream for creation fulfilled. This is best summed up in the following quote from Isaac Pennington with which New England Yearly Meeting ended their epistle:

Our life is love and peace and tenderness, and bearing one another, and forgiving one another, and not laying accusations one against another; but praying one for another, and helping one another up with a tender hand, if there has been any slip or fall: and waiting till the Lord gives sense and repentance, if sense and repentance in any be wanting.

The Yearly Meeting Message was prepared and read by Don Farlow of Southern Quarter:

Yearly Meeting Message 2011
Yearly Meeting Theme: Integrity

The Presiding Clerk opened our 314th Annual Session of North Carolina Yearly Meeting with the following Minute: “We come to these sessions to consider the Friends testimony on integrity. God must be in the center of our lives for us to fully live this testimony. We can carry it out this weekend in these sessions by focusing and spending time listening to the Spirit, putting aside our desires, our wants, being open and having a little humility. We must **not only** listen for the Spirit but be willing to be led by the Spirit, and we must be willing to be led by the Spirit whether the Spirit is speaking within oneself or through someone else.”

Sylvia Graves, retiring General Secretary of Friends United Meeting, echoing the themes of the 2011 Triennial Sessions, encouraged us to allow Christ to transform us, to allow God to work through us and to be ready to do the work God calls us to do.

On Saturday, in the Morning Call to Worship, Bill Eagles charged us that integrity must begin with the idea that I **might** be wrong: that “gathered Friends”, utilizing the Quaker process of seeking the Spirit’s leading, yield the best corporate guidance. Attendance at Saturday’s business sessions was greater than anticipated as additional seating had to be provided for the meeting room. Especially noteworthy was the presence of 62 Young Adults, many of whom are a part of Campus Ministries, the NCYM Intern Program or the Quaker Lake “summer staff”.

John Porter began his challenge for North Carolina Yearly Meeting with what is often our preferred application of integrity: “what we expect of others, but do not necessarily apply to ourselves.” He proceeded to share a variety of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats that he saw being central to the future of the Yearly Meeting. He noted that perhaps the most serious threat is conflict that is not addressed, whether in our local meetings or across the Yearly Meeting. He challenged us to always treat one another with civility and love as we differ, noting that we will be known by the integrity with which we (all) minister.

Reports and videos reflected on the wide range of efforts across the Yearly Meeting supporting the various Program Ministries: from the offerings at Quaker Lake Camp to numerous Young Friends programs; from Friends Campus Ministries and the Intern Program to the broader Young Adult Program; from MOWA to Jamaica; from SOUL in Alabama to SOUL in Eastern Quarter. The energy and enthusiasm evident in both leaders and participants in these programs inspire us all.

Ministry and Counsel presented four names for approval to be recorded as Ministers of the Gospel of Christ. The recording of Georgianne Satterfield, Sarah Vestal, Richard Wilcox and Jennifer York was approved by the Yearly Meeting. We also recognized the retirement of Ken Spivey from the ministry. Twenty-five women and men continue under the care of the Recording Committee.

The Executive Committee presented and recommended Randy Quate to succeed John Porter as Superintendent, North Carolina Yearly Meeting of Friends. After comments by Randy and a question and answer session, Randy Quate was approved as the next Superintendent of North Carolina Yearly Meeting. In his initial remarks, in the question and answer session, and in his brief remarks following his approval, Randy described what he saw as the “DNA” of North Carolina Yearly Meeting and his commitment to nurture these foundations: North Carolina Yearly Meeting is rooted in Biblical

Christianity: centered in Christ Jesus; and committed to the unique, holy, Quaker expression of the Christian faith. Randy concluded his remarks reminding us of the thankfulness we should share for the service of John and Mary Porter.

The Minute of Advice for 2011 based on the Spiritual Condition Reports focuses on three areas: Faithful Service, Economic Challenge and Change, Authentic Community, and Cautions. Advice centers on faithful presentations of the gospel, continually maintaining the fellowship of believers, teaching the relevance of the underlying values of Friends' history and traditions, and avoidance of complacency.

Ron Bryan, General Superintendent of Iowa Yearly Meeting, spoke to our theme of Integrity throughout these Yearly Meeting Sessions. Utilizing Romans 12:1-2 and Titus 2:6-8, he reminded us that Christ brings a transformation that leads to change in how we think and say, and do and act. On Friday evening, Ron shared our Christian walk "is not an easy walk, but it is a sustainable walk." He reminded us that indeed, the first two generations of Quakers were willing to "give it all", and many did. Ron's challenge to us was that our integrity does not grow out of that historical perspective, but out of our own willingness to carry that testimony forward. Our individual integrity is dependent on our willingness to humble ourselves before God, "our Teacher, our Counselor, and our Checker." We can call on the Spirit, the Scriptures and reason (including that of the "gathered body") to guide our journey.

Saturday evening, Ron reminded us that it is in view of God's mercy, out of our gratitude for God's mercy, we present ourselves a living sacrifice. And in a very significant way, we demonstrate that by living our lives as a living testimony of God's action in our lives. As Ron said, "that requires real integrity." We really have to think about what we say and what we do. And further from Ron, "It is the love of God and the power of the Spirit that cause and enable me to make amends and not repeat my failings when my thoughts and speech and actions do not match." Ron again probed, "How do we stack up?" compared to those first and second generation Quakers who went to prison to maintain their integrity. As ministers (in the Quaker sense), Ron cautioned us all to "guard our heart, our tongue, our calling, our testimony, our mind and our family; to mind God's voice when He speaks." Ron concluded his message with, "Listen for God's Spirit. He will lead us – together!"

Our Yearly Meeting theme of "integrity" was also the focus of five interest groups: Integrity for a New Generation; Financial Integrity: Doing the Right Thing When No One is Looking; Integrity in Education; Integrity in Communication: Problems with Quick 'N Easy Technology; and Twelve Myths about Funerals: Integrity in the Most

Difficult Times. All of these sessions challenged us to that renewing of our minds that sustains us in our transforming walk.

We depart the 314th Annual Session of North Carolina Yearly Meeting of Friends with a renewed commitment to be a living testimony of the presence of the Living Christ in our lives, daily modeling the integrity to which we are called. As Ron Bryan charged us on Sunday morning, "We have gathered a few sticks; we have kindled a fire; let us make sure we leave it burning."

The Junior Yearly Meeting Epistle, Young Friends Epistle, Summary of Epistles, and NC Yearly Meeting Message were all approved as read.

Recording of Ministers

A recording service was held for the four candidates who had been approved for recording in the Yearly Meeting session. They were Georgianne Satterfield, Sarah Vestal, Richard Wilcox and Jennifer York. There was a time of sharing after the certificates were presented. A reception was held in their honor following the service.

Closing Minute: *Much has been accomplished in this 314th session of North Carolina Yearly Meeting. We've gathered sticks, we kindled a fire, and soon we're going and we'll leave the fire burning. And during the year ahead, we will work in our local meetings, quarterly meetings, and in the Yearly Meeting. Then as we gather here next year, may we find the flame still burning and that it has grown brighter. This 314th annual session is adjourned at the close of the intergenerational session this evening.*

1. Welcome and Announcements: Clerk Linda Selleck called the Ministry and Counsel Meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. on August 6, 2011 at Forsyth Friends Meeting in Winston-Salem, NC. J. J. Jacobson, Pastor of Forsyth Friends, opened with prayer. We began with a period of open worship and a devotional message by Linda Selleck. She said, "Our business is worship. Our worship calls us to respond to the needs of the world in response to the Holy Spirit's leading." Testimonies were shared by various Friends, and our worship ended with the hymn "Into My Heart."

2. Roll Call and Regrets: The morning attendance sheets totaled 98 Friends in attendance, with all nine quarters represented: Contentnea (3), Deep River (5), Eastern (3), Southern (17), Surry (8), New Garden (23), Northwest (2), Western (14), and Yadkin (23). Regrets were extended on behalf of Eddie Oakley, Joe and Ruthanna Reece, and Greg Creed.

3. Appointment of the NCYM Ministry and Counsel Minutes Editing Committee: Jan Greene, Kathy Coe, and Marcy Reed-Smith were approved as the Minutes Editing Committee.

4. Ministry and Counsel Executive Committee: Linda Selleck noted the charge of last year's gathering to the Executive Committee to work on a better way of coordinating the work of the Nominating Committee for Ministry and Counsel.

The Executive Committee met four times last year, and spent considerable time working through the numerous questions and challenges the nominating process has encountered. Recommendations for changes were presented, discussed at length, and after some editing, the following was approved.

APPROVED NCYM MINISTRY AND COUNSEL
NOMINATING COMMITTEE CHANGES

The following recommendations were approved by NCYM Ministry and Counsel in session on August 6, 2011. These changes will be sent on to be reported to the Yearly Meeting in session, then considered at the next Representative Body meeting on November 5, 2011 for approval. If approved, they will be incorporated into the NCYM Administrative Handbook.

1. Beginning immediately after the rise of the August 6, 2011 NCYM Ministry & Counsel gathering, all four positions (Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Recording Clerk, Assistant Recording Clerk) will begin a three-year rotating appointment, with a phase-out of these appointments starting in 2012.
2. NCYM Ministry and Counsel clerks and committee appointments will begin each year of service at the rise of the annual NCYM sessions, and end that year of service at the rise of the next annual NCYM sessions. If there is a transition of clerks, they will coordinate their work between the NCYM Ministry and Counsel meeting and the Yearly Meeting sessions, and continue their tasks until completed.
3. Friends may be re-appointed for an additional 3-year term, to serve a maximum of 6 continuous years.
4. After at least one year, Friends may be appointed to serve again.
5. The Convener of the Nominating Committee for NCYM Ministry and Counsel will be the Assistant Clerk of NCYM Ministry and Counsel, and will work closely with the Chairperson of the Nominating Committee.
6. The Chairperson of the Nominating Committee will be appointed by the Quarter responsible for Ministry and Counsel Nominating Committee oversight through annual rotations.
 - Therefore, Eastern Quarter will be charged to appoint this Chairperson for 2011-2012.
 - Quarterly Meeting Ministry and Counsels, or their designees, are asked to make their appointment as soon as possible after the annual Ministry and Counsel meeting, and inform the Clerk and Assistant Clerk of NCYM Ministry and Counsel.
 - Once appointed, the Chairperson of the Nominating Committee is to begin serving immediately.
 - Both the Friend appointed to chair the Nominating Committee, and that Quarter's representative to NCYM Ministry and Counsel, will serve on the Nominating Committee.
 - We recommend that Quarters appoint their representative to NCYM Ministry and Counsel for more than a one-year period.
7. The rotating Quarter's appointed Chair of the Nominating Committee will also be a member of the NCYM Ministry and Counsel Executive Committee.
8. When a NCYM Ministry and Counsel position becomes vacant, it will remain vacant until Ministry and Counsel fills that position.

5. Ministry and Counsel Nominating Committee Report: Wallace Sills and Eddie Oakley from Deep River Quarter coordinated the work of the Ministry and Counsel Nominating Committee, working within the guidelines given for the work. Linda Selleck expressed appreciation to Wallace Sills and Eddie Oakley and the entire committee for their hard and thorough work.

6. Report by the Spiritual Life Commission: Chairperson Brady Morrison reported for the Spiritual Life Commission. The 2011 Minute of

Advice was read and approved. It comprises reports of thirty-nine monthly meetings. Brady also spoke about the Ministers and Elders Conference held at Cane Creek Friends Meeting on February 5, 2011, where the topics of the history of spiritual gifts, and the discerning of spiritual gifts, were presented by Ron Selleck and Michael Fulp, Jr.

The Spiritual Life Commission will hold their third Revival Gathering on Saturday, October 15, 2011 at Hopewell Friends Meeting, starting with a workshop on generational worship differences at 3:00 p.m. The worship service will begin at 6:15 p.m., and the speakers will be Daniel Thames and Jennifer York.

7. Report by the Committee on Training and Recording of Ministers: Chairperson Daniel Thames gave the report. Former clerk, David Brindle, moved out of state in the early winter, and Daniel, the assistant clerk, accepted David's position.

The Committee has created a new Recording Committee Brochure to be distributed among the Meetings in North Carolina Yearly Meeting. It is taken verbatim from our approved Faith and Practice, but is presented in a more brief form to aid meetings and their Ministry and Counsel in the process of discerning a candidate's call to ministry in NCYM and the Recording nomination process.

The *Handbook of Procedures for Recording of Ministers* was revised with updated curriculum requirements. Other items under consideration include looking into a separate track for chaplaincy vocations, and addressing the need for flexibility in helping prepare candidates for various areas of ministry work.

The committee reported two additional changes in guidelines for candidates: 1) the previous three-year minimum requirement has been changed to two to three years, depending on the individual candidate's history with Friends and with NCYM, and 2) candidates are expected to complete their requirements within five to six years.

8. Nominations for Recording Candidates: Linda Selleck read a letter from Yadkin Valley Quarterly Meeting, dated July 17, 2011, nominating Hobert Freeman as a Recording candidate. Hobert Freeman is the minister for Mountain View Friends in Galax, Virginia. Archie Creed said, "It has been a joy to watch Hobert Freeman work and grow at Union Cross, help others, and begin his spiritual journey." Steve Choplin said, "Hobert is very active in the Quarter. He is proud of how he has begun this Christian journey." Friends Brady Morrison, Bob Choplin, and Wallace Sills also spoke to Hobert's qualifications. After no further discussion, it was approved to place Hobert Freeman under the care of the Recording Committee.

A letter from Western Quarterly Meeting of Friends, dated February 12, 2011, was read that nominated Cathy Moody from Plainfield Friends Meeting to be placed under the care of the Recording Committee. A retired nurse, Cathy said, "My ministry is not in the pulpit. I am called to Chaplaincy; my years as a nurse are not wasted." Friends David

Hobson and Ken Spivey spoke with appreciation for Cathy's spiritual gifts and call. After no further discussion, it was approved to place Cathy Moody under the care of the Recording Committee.

9. Report on Recording Candidates That Have Completed All Requirements: Daniel Thames brought forward the names of four Recording candidates who have completed all the required work and whose names were approved by the Recording Committee to be brought to Ministry and Counsel for consideration. After discussion, these Friends were approved to be considered for approval as Recorded Ministers by the Yearly Meeting in session on Saturday, September 3: Georgianne Satterfield, Sarah Vestal, Richard Wilcox, and Jennifer York.

Daniel reported that there were no Friends at this time recognized as Accepted Pastoral Supply. Candidates who met with the Committee and made progress in their requirements toward recording, and who will continue under the care of the Recording Committee for the next year are: Ernest Brown, Michael Butler, Michael Coats, Gary Lee Crum, Brandon Dockery, Joey Greene, J. J. Jacobson, Kathy Kellum, Lisa Lundeen-Nagel, Frank Massey, David Millikan, Lisa Moran, Loren Pierce-Coleman, and William Vaughn.

Candidates who met with the Committee but did not make progress in their requirements for Recording, but will continue under the care of the Recording Committee for the next year are: Betsy Blake, Danielle Brown, Josh Conrad, Brandon Godfrey, Sheila Hoyer, Andrew Needham, Amanda Smith, and Michael Thames.

Travis Briles has moved to Illinois but has asked to be placed on hiatus, as he plans to return to North Carolina after his wife's education is completed.

The Recording Committee recommended discontinuing the recording process for the following candidates: Tom Barton, Steven Caudill, and William Garner.

Tom Barton was placed under the care of the Committee as a candidate for Accepted Pastoral Supply. However, since he is not currently a pastor, he does not meet the requirements. Steven Caudill does not have an undergraduate degree, does not want to preach, and is not yet ready for recording.

William Garner, after nine years under the care of the committee, has made little progress in completing the required work. After discussion, it was approved to discontinue Tom Barton, Steven Caudill, and William Garner as candidates for recording.

10. Consideration of Recording Candidate Debbie Parvin: Linda Selleck introduced the concern brought to Ministry and Counsel today by the Recording Committee over the recording of candidate Debbie Parvin. She read a joint letter sent from New Garden Friends Meeting, Fancy Gap Preparative Meeting, and Mount Airy Friends Meeting in support of approving the recording of Debbie Parvin as a Minister in NCYM. This joint letter is attached to these minutes.

Daniel Thames reported that although candidate Debbie Parvin had completed all work required, the Recording Committee recommends that she not be recorded. The most significant concern was Debbie Parvin's beliefs concerning our Yearly Meeting essential truths as stated in our Faith and Practice regarding the issues of Christ's atonement for sins, the use of scripture and its veracity, salvation and judgment. Other members of the Recording Committee spoke to the concern, and a long and at times difficult period of discussion followed with as many as twenty-five Friends expressing opinions reflecting both sides of the issues. Several Friends who had to leave early submitted written concerns. Marcy Reid-Smith read a letter written by Daniel Thames to Debbie Parvin in which he communicated concerns and reasons why the Recording Committee could not reach unity to record her. This letter is attached to these minutes.

As the sense of the meeting could not be reached, Ministry and Counsel approved not making a decision regarding the recording of Debbie Parvin at this time. Superintendent John Porter suggested that information be sent out to all Monthly Meeting and Ministry and Counsel clerks and ministers that set forth the concerns of the Recording Committee, along with the letter from New Garden, Fancy Gap and Mount Airy Friends, and a cover letter of explanation by the Clerk. Friends may send their responses to Linda Selleck until November 30, 2011. The Executive Committee of the Ministry and Counsel will read, discuss, and reflect upon the letters, then announce a date for a called meeting of Ministry and Counsel for continued consideration.

11. Concluding Remarks: Forsyth Friends Meeting was thanked with appreciation for their hospitality and delicious lunch. The next annual meeting of NCYM Ministry and Counsel is scheduled for Saturday, August 4, 2012 at 10:00 a.m. at Bethesda Friends. Linda Selleck concluded the meeting by saying, "Through Jesus Christ, impossibilities can become possibilities. Through His Holy Spirit all things are possible. I believe that everyone here wants the best for North Carolina Yearly Meeting." Deborah Suess, pastor of Greensboro First Friends Meeting, with another Friend, led us in singing "Shine Out of My Life, Lord Jesus" in closing.

New Garden Monthly Meeting in session on 7th month, 3rd day, 2011, approved the following letter to Linda Selleck, Clerk of Meeting on Ministry and Counsel, North Carolina Yearly Meeting, scheduled to meet on 8th month, 6th day, 2011 at Forsyth Friends Meeting. The letter has also been approved by Fancy Gap Friends Meeting, (7th Month, 6th day, 2011) where Debbie Parvin began her journey as a Friend, and by Mt. Airy Friends Meeting, (7th Month, 20th day, 2011) which first put her name forward to Surry Quarterly Meeting after she had served Mt. Airy as associate pastor.

TO: Linda Selleck, Clerk
Meeting on Ministry and Counsel, North Carolina Yearly Meeting

Fancy Gap, Mt. Airy, and New Garden Friends Meetings all agree with the recommendation that Debbie Parvin be recorded by North Carolina Yearly Meeting as a minister. We know her to be a talented preacher and writer with a pastoral heart. Knowing her gifts, we are dismayed to learn that her recording has been rejected by the Recording Committee, and especially that this occurred at the very end of the process after completing her work and having positive meetings with the committee over the course of the three years leading up to what was to have been her exit interview. After three years, at her next to last meeting with the committee, Debbie was assigned a mentor, who worked with her on articulating beliefs questioned by the committee. Unfortunately, the mentor was unable to attend Debbie's final committee meeting due to a family funeral, and the mentor's input was not included in the final decision. We are concerned that the disapproval was the result not of any shortcoming of Debbie's in her work or otherwise but of theological differences with the current recording committee. It does appear that the make-up of the committee was skewed by not being representative of the various quarters and by a range of beliefs somewhat narrower than the range of beliefs within the Yearly Meeting.

We have been impressed by the range of experiences that have helped prepare Debbie for her calling to service as a minister, including the following:

Debbie attended Lexington Theological Seminary. She spent ten years writing Sunday school curriculum for children, youth and women, both for a denominational press and for an ecumenical press, which serves all of North America. Christian denominations which used this curriculum include

Christian Church (Disciples of Christ)
Church of the Brethren
Cumberland Presbyterian Church
Moravian Church of America (Southern Province)

Writing for such a wide audience required Debbie to be sensitive to many different theological points of view.

During this time Debbie was also a regular contributor to devotional magazines. In addition to serving in ministerial roles in Mt. Airy and in Virginia, Debbie has worked with the Shepherd Center. While at Mt. Airy Friends, she participated in the ministerial association, with their radio ministry, and in community Lenten services. She also served as an adjunct chaplain, completing a nine-month course in Pastoral Care in Community through Duke Divinity School.

Debbie's wealth of experience demonstrates that she would be an asset to the Yearly Meeting. More importantly, Debbie's life reflects her theology and places her at the core of Quaker and Christian values.

Since Quakers are non-creedal, and because Debbie's views are well within the range of views within NCYM, we feel that her gifts for ministry should be recorded.

If, however, Debbie's gifts are not recorded, we put forward the following queries for consideration by the appropriate bodies to address the implications of this decision:

- What is the role of the recording committee? Is it to hold candidates to a certain theological understanding not shared by a significant portion of the Yearly Meeting? Or is it to recognize the gifts of those put forward by Monthly Meetings and to help them strengthen their understanding of a Quaker Christian faith and to find their calling and place to serve within NCYM?
- In light of the fact that NCYM is not creedal, what does the current action of the recording committee imply?
- Is it important that the recording committee represent the full range of geography and belief of NCYM?

We are asking that the Meeting on Ministry and Counsel consider these questions. We are hopeful that after examining these issues and realizing her gifts, NC Yearly Meeting will record Debbie Parvin's gifts for ministry.

We come in Christ's love seeking to work together for a recording process that works for the greater good of the meetings, for Yearly Meeting, for the people who have been called to the ministry, and for God's work among us.

ATTACHMENT # 2: Letter to Debbie Parvin from Danial Thames

The following letter, dated March 9, 2011, was written by Daniel Thames to Debbie Parvin in response to Debbie's letter written to Daniel, dated March 7, 2011, in which she notes that the Recording Committee would be meeting on March 8, and that she hopes to hear from and receive a written response with the Committee's decision shortly after that time.

Letter Dated March 9, 2011

Subject: Re: Request from Debbie Parvin

Debbie,

The Recording Committee met today and discussed your candidacy for recording. The committee could not find unity in recommending that you be recorded. There are specific reasons why the committee felt they could not approve moving forward with the process.

The opinion of the committee is that your theology, especially in certain areas, is not well-developed. In the story you shared with the committee last month, you shared about meeting a stranger in a bathroom. You expressed your sensitivity to her pain and your desire to help her through the pain. You also shared your disgust with a minister who would tell a grieving mother that her son would not be going to heaven. The concern shared by those in the committee is that you were quick to judge and condemn the minister while wanting to affirm that the son was most surely going to heaven. This assumption was made without any knowledge as to the life the son was living. While most people would have a desire that all will go to heaven, some people do choose evil over good. They do choose to live against a good and loving God. They choose to commit evil acts and honor evil intentions. These choices can be seen as a person's desire not to be with God, honor God or want to go to heaven and live with God.

To say that all people will end up in heaven without struggling with the concept of good and evil, a person's free choice to choose God or choose against God, or the theme of judgment as taught by the Bible are all evidences that the committee felt were indicative of an under-developed theology. The other main issue is that of universal salvation, regardless of a particular religion. You stated very forthrightly that you believed that followers of all religions were essentially followers of the same God and would all eventually lead to heaven. This is contrary to the teachings of Jesus in the Bible.

From the Ten Commandments where God warns of putting other gods before Him, to the statement by Jesus in John 14:6 that He is "the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except

through me," all indicate that there are false gods and one true God. The committee felt that you had not really struggled with how these scriptures and others fit into your theology. It appears to the committee that in your desire to offer the hope and comfort to people that they will eventually end up in heaven, you have disregarded scripture in general. It seems to the committee that when scripture comes into conflict with your preconceived notions, you simply disregard that scripture. It also appears to the committee that, instead of struggling with the decision, you make the decision to disregard scripture too easily.

It was the feeling of the committee that in these situations, your views do not very well represent North Carolina Yearly Meeting as it represents itself in our Faith and Practice. These are not necessarily the only concerns but represent those the committee expressed.

We have two options moving forward:

The committee will recommend to North Carolina Yearly Meeting Ministry and Counsel in its session on August 6, 2011 at Forsyth Friends Meeting that your name be removed from among those under the care of the Recording Committee. If there are questions as to why we make this recommendation, we will be prepared to offer reasons.

If you don't want this conversation to take place, you may ask that your name be removed from consideration for recording before that meeting and we will simply report that you have removed yourself from the process and we will not enter into a more detailed discussion. We feel that this option is a courtesy we are offering to you. It is your decision as to how you would like to proceed. We do ask that if you plan to withdraw from the process, you do so in writing before April 12, which is our next meeting.

If you would like any clarification about this, or would like to continue any communication with the committee, we would welcome it.

**Friends Historical Collection at Guilford College
NCYM (FUM) Annual Report, 2010-2011**

The biggest news of this year is that the Friends Historical Collection, along with our sister collections at Earlham, Haverford, and Swarthmore Colleges, completed an agreement which will make our unique historic Quaker records available online through a partnership with Ancestry.com. Negotiations began several years ago and included formal approval by both North Carolina Yearly Meetings. The final contract was signed on March 14, 2011. A guiding principle in our negotiations was that no records would be less available than they are now. The actual digitization process of the North Carolina Yearly Meeting records will take place in the coming year and information about the final product will appear in next year's report.

North Carolina Yearly Meeting Archives Assistant Ian Michie completed several years of service and moved on to focus more fully on his graduate studies in history at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Elizabeth (Beth) Saunders, a former researcher in the collection and a member of Archdale Friends, replaced him in January 2011. Beth quickly picked up the various duties, the primary of which is processing incoming meeting minutes and papers for the archives. She completed a mammoth project doing a detailed inventory in preparation for our digitization by Ancestry.com. She also worked on a plan for an improved arrangement of our Quaker records for better use of space in the closed stack (vault area), so that we can continue to add new minutes and other permanent papers coming from meetings.

Image requests continue to be popular and the Friends Historical Collection assisted with several projects on North Carolina Yearly Meeting topics by providing digital scans of photographs for a pictorial history of Spring Meeting and for Billy Britt's forthcoming book on North Carolina Quaker leaders. Images were also located and sent for a project documenting the earlier decades of the Ramallah Friends School, which is sponsored by Friends United Meeting.

Cemetery Committee

The Cemetery Committee met January 22, 2011 at the Quaker Lake Conference Center in conjunction with the Yearly Meeting All Committee Day.

The ownership of the Eno Meeting House and burial grounds property has not been resolved. However, at the November sessions of Representative Body, it was felt that the North Carolina Cemetery laws provided enough protections against development and encroachment and approved the Cemetery Committee to proceed with the project of erecting a permanent identifying marker. The research has been completed and lettering approved, with a dedication ceremony planned for early fall. Cane Creek Friends had close ties to the Eno Meeting in the early years with several marriages which have resulted today in many descendants of these marriages in the Cane Creek, Spring, Chatham and South Fork area. As a result of this closeness, Cane Creek will fund part of the lettering on the marker.

The Committee approved a resolution that any new or replacement stones be in keeping with the grave markers of that period, not elaborate.

The Committee approved that Friends be permitted to use the cemeteries for interment, if desired, and that any monies collected from the sale of plats be placed with the trustees of trust funds.

The Committee approved beginning to collect information on all the cemeteries with which the Committee had worked since it was formed, with the goal of being published. It was agreed this would be an extensive project; but, with each member working in their respective Quarter or local area, it could be accomplished.

The ongoing projects, under the oversight of the Committee, continue to be maintained.

As always, the Committee requests that each Meeting assist us in locating abandoned Quaker burial sites in their area and identifying families that would be interested in being a part of the marking and maintenance of the burial sites of their ancestors.

Christian Education Committee

A brief summary of committee activities for the past twelve months is shown below:

I. Leadership Development

One of the duties of this committee is to provide leadership training opportunities. This year we hosted two excellent sessions in conjunction with the YFAC youth workers appreciation days in March. The first was held at Deep River; and Christi Anna Coats, the children's minister at Poplar Ridge, gave an excellent

presentation - "Shaping Children using Story, Ritual, and Relationship." The second workshop was at Nahunta where Marsha Woods gave energetic and youth friendly hands-on children's ministry ideas.

II. Quaker Lake

The CE committee also helped the Quaker Lake staff sponsor the Pumpkin Festival in October which was a huge success both in attendees and activities for all ages. In April, we helped with the Easter Egg Roll at Quaker Lake. Marian Tillman from Archdale was our storyteller and she shared favorite Easter stories with the children. The weather was a little damp, but the children and youth enjoyed a great day of egg hunting, crafts, music and games.

III. Junior Yearly Meeting

Junior Yearly Meeting will have the experience of Rebecca Jackson and Patty Burgess with the older group and Julie Ann Hutchens leading the younger group, assisted by Karen Morrison. Volunteers also include Becca Allen and Jeannie Lamb who bring great ideas for crafts and activities.

IV. Jamaican Ministry

A major undertaking of the CE Committee is our work with the Jamaican Ministry. Last year the committee entered into a memorandum of agreement with Jamaica Yearly Meeting to assist with (1) Pastoral Training, (2) Leadership Development, and (3) Infrastructure Improvement. This year we began implementing the agreement. Early in the year, John Porter and Brent McKinney traveled to Jamaica and helped the Executive Committee develop goals and specific plans for carrying out the long-range plans for pastoral and leadership training. Brent returned later to meet with the pastors to share ideas for sermon preparation. The JYM Executive Committee was challenged to find two young people to enroll in the leadership training program. Applications for this process were devised by members of the Jamaica Yearly Meeting Executive Committee.

V. Jamaica Vacation Bible School

This past year NCYM lost a great friend and supporter with the death of Angella Beharie who helped Myra Brady begin the Vacation Bible School nineteen years ago. Angella was General Secretary of the Friends Education Council in Jamaica and was dearly loved by the young people she supported and mentored. Darlene Pittman, Brent and Brenda McKinney traveled to Jamaica in December to speak at her funeral on behalf of NCYM, FUM, and USFW.

Myra and Darlene traveled to Jamaica in March to meet with each VBS site to insure the Jamaica Friends that the Bible School program would continue even though we greatly miss Angella's support, input and dedication. In June, Myra and Darlene returned

to Jamaica for teacher training. This year's Vacation Bible School saw four meetings conducting Bible School on their own and the addition of a new site at Worthington. Dwight Kendall videoed all the meetings and Brent interviewed the pastors and other "weighty friends."

The VBS team feels great pride in seeing the youth that we formerly taught now stepping up to lead and teach Bible school. Our next important step is seeing that those young people called to the ministry and leadership roles receive the proper training, support and encouragement.

Christian Vocations Committee

The Christian Vocations Committee administers two separate educational funds under the care of the Yearly Meeting. The larger of the two, the Barker Fund, was left to the Yearly Meeting to assist in the training and education of members of the Yearly Meeting seeking to prepare themselves for full-time Christian service. Since its creation more than 30 years ago, interest from this fund has helped many people in North Carolina Yearly Meeting with their educational expenses. In accordance with the wishes of the donor, this fund is restricted and can only be used in Quaker related colleges or institutions of higher learning. Applicants can receive as much as \$3,000 per year from this fund.

There is also a smaller general fund made up of several different bequests and memorial funds that were also designated to be used for educational purposes. These funds are unrestricted and can be used at any accredited college by a member of the Yearly Meeting preparing for full-time Christian service. The maximum amount an individual can receive per year from this fund is \$2,000.

All monies received from Christian Vocations come in form of forgivable loans which can be repaid by full-time service in the Yearly Meeting after graduation or upon completion of the individual's program of study. This past year the Committee worked with individuals from Deep River, Eastern, New Garden, and Southern quarters providing over \$10,000 in financial assistance. Funds were also given as a grant to the Ministers' Association to help underwrite the cost of their annual retreat at Oak Island.

Church Extension Committee

The North Carolina Yearly Meeting Church Extension Committee met four times for business and concerns and once for a brainstorming session. Three projects are currently funded through church extension.

Friends Campus Ministries continues to be blessed of God and is bearing spiritual fruit in the lives of individual college students and within the North Carolina Yearly Meeting. FCM continues to grow with a FCM group at UNC-Greensboro, North Carolina State University, UNC-Charlotte and Western University/ Montreat College. Sarah Vestal, UNC-G Campus Minister, along with the support of the Yearly Meeting Staff, presented a proposal before the committee in the spring of 2011. The proposal was to fund a joint position of Director for Friends Campus Ministries and Campus Minister at UNC-Greensboro, and part-time minister positions at NC State, UNC-Charlotte and Western Carolina University. The committee approved funding of \$79,500 for the 2011-2012 school year. Sarah Vestal will fill the position of FCM Director and UNC-G Campus Minister.

Friends Campus Ministries has been blessed by God and grown well beyond the committee's expectations. While this is extremely exciting and gratifying, it has also taxed the funds that the committee has available. Committee members, FCM, and Yearly Meeting staff have begun praying over this concern, and with the guidance of the Holy Spirit have begun meeting to find other funding avenues. FCM arose from the simultaneous leading of the Holy Spirit within three committees. The Lord will be faithful to provide for that which He has begun.

The Church Extension Committee continues to support the small meetings pilot project at Harmony Grove Friends Meeting through the funding of an associate pastor position. Limited numerical growth was report during the first year, but some involved have reported a reinvigorated worship and increased activity and involvement from its members. The meeting did see an increase in the average attendance during this past July which has been a source of encouragement. The pilot project will terminate at the end of June 2012.

The committee held a brain-storming session in October, 2011. Those who have experience in starting new works and those who have an interest in seeing new meetings begun were invited to come and share their thoughts and ideas. The purpose of this session was to help the committee develop new guidelines for establishing new meetings. The Holy Spirit was evident in this time of sharing and the ideas and thoughts shared were very insightful. Although new guidelines have yet to be developed, the committee members have been more open to new and inventive methods for establishing new meetings.

Out of this brain-storming session, a pastor with a burden for the Mooresville area began praying which lead to discussions with the committee in the spring of 2011. Following several meetings, the church

extension committee approved funding for 18 months for a pastor, youth pastor and church administrator to begin work in Mooresville, NC starting in August of 2011. The pastoral team is Mike Wall, pastor; Marcus Wall, youth pastor; and Christine Blamer, administration. Mike Wall will continue his ministry at Southview Friends Meeting and travel between Charlotte and Mooresville. Marcus Wall will be moving into the Mooresville community at the end of the summer. Prayers for the success of this meeting plant are solicited from all Yearly Meeting members.

Regrettably, a preparatory meeting was laid down at the end of September, 2010. Reece Wall retired following five years of work in Oak Ridge, NC to establish a new meeting. Reece Wall has given over 50 years of faithful service to the Lord and the NCYM. The Church Extension Committee sends their sincere appreciation for his dedication and service.

The Church Extension Committee received disappointing news from Asheboro Friends Meeting regarding their Hispanic ministry outreach. Asheboro Friends discontinued this outreach after much prayer due to limited participation from the Hispanic community. The committee expresses appreciation to Asheboro Friends for their willingness to reach out to this sector of the community. The committee still seeks to encourage and support meetings that wish to reach across cultural barriers to share the gospel of Jesus Christ.

It is exciting to see God manifest himself in the works of which the committee has been blessed to be a part. Regrettably, the available funds have decreased due to the economic downturn. The committee is making plans to create a presentation to share with Quarterly and Monthly Meetings this coming year. The committee seeks to educate Yearly Meeting members on the responsibilities and purpose of the Church Extension Committee and the benefits to NCYM through the work of this committee. The prayer of committee members is that God will instill a church planting mentality throughout the North Carolina Yearly Meeting and raise up those who wish to be a part through prayer and financial support.

The Church Extension Committee recognizes the importance of the work to which it has been charged. The committee seeks to be guided by the Holy Spirit in all it does and covets the prayers of faithful followers of Christ throughout NCYM.

Friends Committee on National Legislation (NCYM)

2010-2011 has been a year of administrative transition and legislative successes for FCNL. At the end of February, Joe Volk, who had provided many years of excellent leadership as Executive Secretary of

FCNL, retired. Diane Randall was brought in as the new Executive Secretary, and the work of FCNL has proceeded smoothly.

Four members of North Carolina Yearly Meeting (FUM) attended the FCNL Annual Meeting in Washington in November. A key piece of business was the adoption of legislative priorities for the session of Congress which began in January 2011. These priorities guide the work not only of the professional staff in Washington but also of Friends across the country who participate in the lobbying effort.

Friends in North Carolina are encouraged to use the FCNL website as a means of keeping up with legislative actions in Washington and as a way to lobby online using the FCNL materials.

A major legislative success in December was the ratification of the new Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty (START) with Russia. This treaty is a big step toward creating a world free of nuclear weapons. A second success is an area in which FCNL has worked for a long time, the Cobell settlement, which opens the way for hundreds of thousands of Native Americans to receive money which the Federal government owes them for the use of their land. Progress has also been made through lobbying for congressional action to address global warming, reduced military spending, and withdrawal of troops from Afghanistan.

In 2011, FCNL's powerful combination of skilled staff lobbyists and an energized grassroots Quaker network throughout the country is working together to protect the world from nuclear weapons, to end the war in Afghanistan, to invest in the peaceful prevention of deadly conflict, and to mobilize a national effort to make real cuts in Pentagon spending. Here in Washington and at Friends Meetings and Churches around the country, Quakers are building bridges of understanding with Muslims, are working together for real reform of our nation's broken immigration laws, and are championing effective solutions to address global greenhouse gas pollution.

FCNL offers an advocacy witness by Friends in our nation's capital and the Quaker community is recognized and respected in Washington as a leader for peace and justice. We invite Friends everywhere to strengthen their connection with the FCNL community by reading our FCNL *Washington Newsletter*, visiting our website www.fcnl.org, signing

up and taking action through our email updates from Washington, or making a contribution.

Here are some of the accomplishments of the FCNL community:

Advancing a World Free of Nuclear Weapons: After an intense, 16-month campaign in key states, FCNL won on ratification of the new START treaty. The final Senate ratification vote of 71 to 26 was a huge success. It mobilized a Senate super majority in favor of international engagement as the path to greater security for our country. It sets the stage for work to prevent cuts in nuclear nonproliferation funding and ratification of the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty.

Preventing War: FCNL won – unanimously – on passage of a critical Genocide Prevention resolution in the Senate. S.Con.Res. 71 calls on the U.S. government to take specific steps to prevent genocides and mass atrocities before they happen. FCNL worked closely with Senate staff on the resolution and helped build its bipartisan list of 22 cosponsors. Now we will be proposing further congressional actions, as part of a multi-year legislative campaign to improve U.S. capacities to peacefully prevent deadly conflict.

War Is Not the Answer: The U.S. “shock and awe” security policy is not working. After a decade of continuous war, increasing numbers of people are reacting against the violence and cost of a military-based solution to conflict. More than 160 members of Congress last year voted against sustaining the Afghanistan war. By early 2011, we saw growing bipartisan support to end the failed war strategy in Afghanistan. We at FCNL are lobbying Congress to call for an end to that war and to put in place policies to prevent conflict and encourage effective development.

Local Action to Advance Human Needs and Reduce Military Spending: Across the country, local elected officials, religious leaders, community groups, union officials, Quaker meetings and churches, and many other groups are urging Congress to cut the military budget. Our Nation's Checkbook, an FCNL Campaign to spend our tax dollars more wisely, is focusing education and organizing efforts in Michigan, Iowa, Washington and Florida where we see a groundswell of public support for new federal budget priorities.

Congress Approved Cobell Settlement for Native Americans: After decades of advocacy and litigation, the way finally cleared for hundreds of thousands of Native Americans to receive the money that the federal government owes them for the use of their land. FCNL worked steadily for years with our Native American colleagues to achieve justice in this case.

Acting on Global Warming: With FCNL's lobbying, the Carbon Limits and Energy for America's Renewal (CLEAR) Act (S. 2877), emerged in 2010 as a principal bipartisan alternative to the ineffective cap-and-trade approach that had previously been the focus of congressional action. FCNL's lobbyists are working in 2011 to protect the EPA's regulation of

greenhouse gas pollution and support the reintroduction of CLEAR, among other priorities.

Constituent Action FCNL provided the tools for tens of thousands of people to lobby Congress and start conversations in their communities about the world we hope for. More than 17,000 people contacted their elected officials through our website in 2010, sending more than 156,000 communications to their elected officials. We distributed 355,000 War Is Not the Answer signs and bumper stickers in 2010.

Legislative Priorities Set By Friends As has been our practice for 67 years, FCNL's policy and legislative priorities are guided by the discernment of Friends across the country. Many Friends meetings and churches worshipped together to consider priorities for our lobbying work for the 112th Congress (2011-2012). FCNL's General Committee approved priorities in November at our Annual Meeting in Washington, DC and you can review the full text on our website at:

The Vital Financial Support of Friends The prudent stewardship of our operations helped FCNL weather the worldwide economic crisis that battered many nonprofit organizations. We are grateful for the faithful support of meetings, churches and the thousands of individual donors whose contributions form the bulk of our annual income. Yet our funding remains at a level that is not yet sufficient to allow FCNL to take advantage of all the opportunities we see for change. Your continued and growing support for FCNL assures that our engagement on Capitol Hill and throughout our network will be effective and strong. We rely on your support.

Leadership and Change In March 2011, our community completed a wonderful, spirit-led, three year process of moving from the leadership of our long-time Executive Secretary, Joe Volk, to Friend Diane Randall. A long-time member of Hartford Monthly Meeting, New England Yearly Meeting, Diane brings a lifelong commitment to social justice and years of experience in nonprofit management to her new position. The FCNL community celebrates Joe's years of service and the strong, vibrant organization that he has been a part of creating and we are eager to introduce Friends everywhere to Diane.

On behalf of the General Committee, thank you to all Friends for your many contributions of time, energy, and dollars which make FCNL's work possible.

Friends Center Director's Report – 2010-11

Friends Center General Programming

Friends Center's mission is to "strengthen Friends and their institutions," this being accomplished through informational services and general programming, the Quaker Leadership Scholars Program, campus ministry, the Quaker Renewal Program, and special educational and speakers programs.

Information Services

"Quakerism 101," a basic introduction to Quaker history, spirituality, and testimonies, was offered to the campus as a six-week series in the fall, following a four-session Quakerism orientation to all new faculty and staff. "Quakerism 202," a series on Quaker spirituality utilizing the essays of Thomas Kelly, was offered to the community in the spring. Both Kelly's insights and free pizza attracted an average of eight for six sessions. A number of campus historical tours have been offered for Open House, classes, area schools, and other groups. We are working with the Greensboro Area Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Guilford College Neighborhood Alliance to offer historical tours on a regular basis.

Deborah Shaw has continued her work on the Pendle Hill Board, has spoken at Olney Friends Boarding School, led a retreat for Friends in Florida, and will lead a workshop at Woodbrooke in England in May. Frank Massey continues his work with Jamestown Friends Meeting and is supervising William Berry '11 as an intern. William has just received a Cooper Scholarship to attend ESR this fall. Max Carter brought the prepared message in worship for the AFSC Corporation meeting in March, taught in Covenant Presbyterian's Mandala Program, and led a six-session series for the Shepherd's Center on "North Carolina's Quaker character – and Quaker characters." Max was interviewed about Quakerism on two national radio shows and continues to write for the weekly *Washington Post* "On Faith" panel. He and his wife, Jane, led a group of a dozen (including four Guilford students) on a 2 ½ week work/study trip this summer to Palestine and Israel.

Speakers and Programs

Tom Ewell and Cathy Whitmire were the JM Ward Distinguished Quaker Visitors in the fall, speaking in classes and a public lecture about Quaker spirituality and ecumenism. Novelist Haven Kimmel thrilled a large crowd with her readings from a forthcoming book on "Outlaw Quakerism." Trisha Taylor, a Guilford parent, Baptist minister, and licensed marriage counselor, was the Luby Casey Campus Ministry Visitor for Religious Emphasis Week. She made a deep impression both on students and on the NCYM-FUM ministers' association, for whom she led a workshop. Rebecca Grunko '93 and Alexander Levering Kern '94 were the Judith Weller Harvey Quaker Scholars in residence for three days in February, speaking in College Meeting for Worship, attending

classes, and giving a public presentation. They, too, left an indelible impression of the impact of their Guilford education on their subsequent personal and professional lives; their presentation is available in booklet form.

Melanie Weidner, a Quaker artist, who has had several visits to Guilford, returned again under IFP funding to share with the community about art and spirituality. As always, much of her time was taken with one-on-ones with students.

Friends Center organized a panel presentation on the revolutions in North Africa with a political scientist, religious studies professor from Kenya, student from Egypt, and others with expertise in the region. Another panel was organized on "Christianity and War" as part of the AFSC's "Windows and Mirrors" installation on campus. That panel included a religious studies/peace studies student, an ROTC recruiter, a West Point graduate who is now a Quaker, the Episcopal campus minister, and Frank Massey.

Don Wagner, a professor of interfaith studies at Eastern Mennonite University, spent a day on campus March 30 talking about dialogue among the Abrahamic faiths, peace studies, and issues in the Middle East. Friends Center coordinated his visit with the Coalition for Peace and Justice in the Middle East. Members of the Greensboro Jewish Federation were especially invited to participate, and the director and the head of the Jewish Foundation did attend.

Next year's speakers are all confirmed: Stephen Zunes, a political scientist at the University of San Francisco, will be the JM Ward speaker September 15/16; Maia Carter Hallward, a professor of Middle East politics will visit in conjunction with the Zunes visit; Najeeba Syeed-Miller '94, a "rock star" in the interfaith community and professor of interfaith studies at Claremont Theological School, will visit October 12/13; Michael Birkel, professor of religion at Earlham College, will be the Judith Weller Harvey Scholar November 13/14. Shane Claiborne, a noted "red letter Christian," author, and founder of The Simple Way community in Philadelphia, will be the Luby Casey Campus Ministry Visitor January 22/23.

Ben Pink Dandelion, Haven Kimmel, and Tom Hamm are already confirmed for 2012/13.

Campus Ministry

The Guilford Community of Religious Observants has remained active this year, primarily through encouraging community building, producing the *Caw* newsletter, and encouraging interfaith discussion.

College Meeting for Worship attendance has increased, largely through asking speakers to give us names of people they'd like to receive a special invitation. Speakers have also been asked to provide a manuscript of their talks so they can be published in the newsletter, and most have done so. An excellent line-up of speakers has been confirmed for the fall College Meeting for Worship series.

Morning quiet worship and evening Vespers were held throughout the year. “Am I The Only One?” – a group for those wishing to lead a healthy lifestyle in college - met regularly for substance-free fun activities. The Porch, FCA Bible studies, the men’s spirituality group, “New Questions,” “Bible Study for Radicals,” and Guilford Christian Fellowship groups have perked along. Ministry and Spiritual Gifts suppers, under Frank Massey’s careful guidance, continue to attract two dozen for weekly supper conversations with visitors about vocational and spiritual discernment

Ten students accompanied Max Carter and N.C. FDS on a fall break work trip to Alabama, and nine students accompanied Frank Massey and N.C. FDS on a spring break work trip to Mississippi. Another contingent of students on their own went to the Arizona desert with No More Deaths.

A specially called meeting for worship was held in Fourth Month to celebrate the life of David Newton. A member of New Garden Friends Meeting and head of the Art Department, David succumbed to cancer after a valiant 18-month struggle. He was a much cherished professor who won the state award for academic advising in 2010 and was honored with Guilford’s highest community service award. He will be greatly missed.

Academic Offerings

Nine students took the inaugural Quaker Theology course and worked through Barclay, Gurney, and contemporary Quaker theologians. Fifty students took the two Quaker history course offerings during the year, many of them from the older adult “CCE” program. More than twenty took the course on Quaker Testimonies, and ten took a seminar course on Quakerism and Personal Moral Issues. In the fall, we will offer a regular semester and Fast Track Quaker History class, along with Quaker Testimonies and Quaker Faith and Practice. Next spring an inaugural course in Carolina Quaker History will be offered, along with the usual IDS class on intentional communities and another Fast Track Quaker History course.

Adult Programming

Two three-week book studies were offered in the Quaker Renewal Program. Both *The Autobiography of Allen Jay* and *Compartments* attracted 30 attendees each for stimulating discussion. The fall 2011 QRP program will be a series on “hot button” theological and social issues, followed by a book study of *Reconciling All Things*.

Fund Raising

Visits have been made to potential donors to an endowment for the new internship position. No commitments have been made yet.

The Annual Fund exceeded its goal by \$6,000. We are grateful!

Internship Position

The College approved Friends Center’s developing a one-year internship position for a student a few years past graduation who can

assist Friends Center in all our ministries. Two finalists were interviewed, and Nathan Sebens '07 was selected to begin as our first intern. Nathan majored in vocal music at Guilford while active in QLSP. Since graduation, he has studied at the Earlham School of Religion, acted with a professional Theater troupe in Cincinnati, and lived in Philadelphia among a community of "Convergent" young adult Friends – many of whom were Guilford graduates. Nathan is a member of NCYM-FUM.

Friends United Meeting Annual Report to Yearly Meetings

"Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is --his good, pleasing and perfect will." **Romans 12:2**

This theme of the July 2011 gathering of Friends United Meeting in Wilmington, Ohio was selected because the tagline on some of our publications indicates FUM is in the business of transforming lives. Well, we know it is God who does the transforming, but we also know there are steps we can take to position ourselves and others so God can make changes that result in people coming closer to being in his "good,

pleasing and perfect will.” We are glad to report the following evidence that lives are being transformed because of your participation.

Communications: Even though way too few people subscribe to Quaker Life magazine, the feedback we are receiving is very positive. We get notes, calls, and email messages from our readers that comment about how certain articles strike a chord, inspire, or shed new light on an issue for them. Our Quaker Life Advisory Committee is taking a serious look at increasing the number of readers so the work being done to produce this quality magazine will be worthy of our investment and Friends may grow spiritually when they read Quaker Life.

Friends United Press has made available an on-line version of “The 23rd Psalm in Your Own Words.” We’ve had many requests for printed copies as well.

As we try to be good stewards of your contributions, we are limited in time to keep our website as good as we’d like, but our Communications staff of two tries to keep it updated and friendly for your reference, for news, and for ordering materials. We now have an FUM Facebook page and a Quaker Life Facebook page so you can interact with us. We are grateful to Carl Williams who posts every Friday a devotional with the FUM Prayer List for those who are interested in keeping current with prayer needs by email. You can find this list by clicking the link at the bottom of the FUM webpage and/or submitting your email address in the box next to the link.

Global Ministries: You may be surprised that just over 1.3 million dollars was received and disbursed for the work FUM did globally in the past fiscal year! This includes donations sent to support our six Field Staff workers and over 100 funds restricted for various aspects of our ministries in Belize, Cuba, Ramallah, and Kenya/Uganda. Four of those ministries are considered to be “Primary” in that FUM hires the directors, appoints members to the Board of Governors, and oversees the financial records of Kaimosi Hospital, Friends Theological College, Belize Friends School and Ramallah Friends School. The other ministries you support are considered “Secondary” in that FUM acts to endorse and advocate for the work, collaborates with those who manage the project, and channels funds as appropriate to empower the ministries. Here are very brief updates for our primary ministries:

Belize Friends School: All six members of the Barber family participate in the work of giving a second chance at education to youngsters in Belize City who have not succeeded the first time. The enrollment at the beginning of this year was about 25, though later dwindled some. However, the Belize Department of Education has requested that FUM expand the program so the Belize Support team and the FUM staff are looking at ways that might be feasible. There have been four work teams visit the school this year to do painting and repairs.

Ramallah Friends School: Thanks to yet another ASHA grant from the US Government (and funded by a tiny portion of US tax dollars) the

Ramallah Friends Boys School is undergoing more improvements in facilities. This grant (the 8th in 19 years for a total of over \$5 million) is furnishing the new classroom building which was built with an ASHA grant two years ago. The new grant is also being used for the development of a sports field, and updating some access to utilities. Because of these improvements and the implementation of the International Baccalaureate curriculum, students at RFS are excelling at very high levels. Joyce Ajlouny, Director, is also building relationships with alumni who have recently contributed funds to complete a kindergarten center and auditorium for the elementary school. By having these sources to improve facilities, funds that are contributed by individuals, monthly and yearly meetings can go to the operating fund and/or scholarships. Last fall, Joyce traveled among Friends in New York Yearly Meeting to build awareness of this historic ministry among the Palestinians.

Kaimosi Hospital: Since 2006 when FUM signed an agreement (Memo of Understanding) with East Africa Yearly Meeting – Kaimosi to manage Kaimosi Hospital many encouraging steps have taken place:

- The Kaimosi Hospital Task Force was organized to oversee the FUM relationship with the hospital and work with FUM staff to implement the MOU.
- Hospital staff salaries that were badly in arrears up to that point have been kept current. This is largely possible because of the Adopt-A-Nurse program.
- Renovation of half the main hospital building was completed.
- A new ambulance was purchased and plays a significant role in the accessibility to the hospital.
- The patient count increased by a third in the past year.
- A bequest will allow the rest of the main building to be renovated and a resident doctor to be hired.
- A management team serves collaboratively to improve integrity and accountability in the everyday activities of the hospital. Eden Grace serves on that team which meets weekly.

Still, there have been some setbacks with the dismissal of now two administrators since the MOU was signed. The funding for the Comprehensive Care Center to treat AIDS and malaria patients has been terminated due to cutbacks in the global economy. The hospital also struggles with finances due to the number of patients it serves who cannot pay their fees. And, payments from the health insurance company for those patients who carry insurance, is almost always delayed so cash flow is always a challenge. We are constantly reminded that Jesus calls us to take care of the sick and that this is indeed a ministry that serves the poorest of the poor.

Friends Theological College: Now with over 90 students, FTC is offering four programs: Certificate, Diploma, Bachelors Degree and Chaplaincy. Principal Ann Riggs is being assisted by Lon Fendall who is

in charge of staff development, curriculum revisions, and the accreditation process. Last year, FTC received “affiliate status” from ACTEA (Accrediting Council for Theological Education in Africa). This year we have received notice that in order for FTC to continue on tract for full accreditation, at least 50% of the operating fund needs to come from African sources. So, Ann and other staff members have extended efforts to develop more business enterprises in which students can work to earn their own fees. Such initiatives as increasing the dairy herd, establishing a tailoring business, setting up greenhouses for plant and produce sales, and the 2011 Summer Mission project to establish a goat herd are some of the ways we are addressing this requirement. Also, the Africa Yearly Meetings are being asked to contribute financial support and see that they help pay fees for the students they send for training as pastors. We still need support from the US, but more of it will have to be in the form of capital investment that will allow students to work as they study.

The 2010 Summer Mission Project to increase sources for clean water in Kenya was a huge success! We are rejoicing in the contributions of over \$30,000 (Our goal was \$10,000) to purchase bio-sand water filters, tanks for rain water collection, repair some plumbing at Kaimosi Hospital and to drill a second well in Turkana. Your donations have truly brought the water of life to thousands of thirsty people.

We hope all Friends will consider attending the Triennial Conference at Wilmington College July 27-30. We look forward to welcoming Colin Saxton as the new General Secretary. He will begin his service January 2012. Let the transformation begin!

There will not be an annual meeting of FWCC-Section of the Americas in 2012 because of the World Conference of Friends which will be held in Kenya in April of 2012. John Porter has been responsible for contacting those who were interested in attending this gathering. NCYM was allowed 9 representatives and the following names of persons who will represent North Carolina Yearly Meeting FUM are: Sheila Hoyer, First Friends Meeting; Brent and Brenda McKinney, Pine Hill Friends Meeting; Cindy and Dan Perry, Spring Meeting; Betsy Blake, First

Friends Meeting; Dottie and Grimsley Hobbs, Spring Meeting; and Lisa Moran, Deep River Meeting.

Application for affiliation in FWCC SoA from Iglesia Evangelica Union Boliviana Amigos (Bolivian Evangelical Friends Church) was approved with enthusiasm.

Nancy Irving from the World Office reported that the World Conference preparations are in full swing, and she compared the World Conference to a “family reunion” of Friends. Nancy Irving will leave her post at the World Office in London in 2012, following the World Conference.

Minutes of appreciation were entered for Ray Treadway, North Carolina Yearly Meeting Conservative who has served as presiding clerk of Section of the Americas from 2008 to 2011 and Paul Mitchell, North Carolina Yearly Meeting FUM who has served as recording clerk for the same period of time. Their work has been exemplary, and greatly appreciated.

Investment Committee

2011 has been another interesting year in the financial markets with many ups and downs. The August 4th sell-off was a stark reminder of the inherent risks and volatility associated with equities. The U.S. government debt level/possible ratings agency downgrade, anemic GDP growth in Q1 and Q2, high unemployment, a depressed housing market, and European debt/contagion are all significant bearish factors that this market is struggling with. The current macroeconomic forces are very bearish and have trumped what should be a strong earnings finish for U.S equities in Q3 and Q4. I believe the current broad based sell-off should subside if earnings continue to improve. Having said that, I believe the next few months could continue to be volatile and holding dividend-paying equities should minimize the downside while providing some recurring income.

In March 2011, we learned that Jim Watts, our investment manager, was leaving Community One Bank and relocating to New Bridge Bank (Asheboro NC). This caused the Investment Committee to make a decision to either switch our investments to New Bridge Bank or maintain our relationship with Community One. Community One did not have an active investment management service during the transition when Jim Watts left. The investment committee decided to have meetings with Jim Watts/New Bridge Bank as well as Community One and their new investment management partner Novare. These meetings took place in April and May. In late May/early June the Investment Committee decided to follow Jim Watts to New Bridge Bank because the committee was satisfied with his performance and his conservative investment philosophy and excellent customer service.

During March and April, we essentially did not have an investment manager. The Investment Committee met and decided to harvest some significant gains (equities). The decision was further made to use these proceeds to pay off the NCYM line of credit. While this was not a welcome turn of events, the committee felt it was both necessary and prudent to do so to continue to pay NCYM bills in a timely manner.

The Investment Committee continues to rely on the stewardship of Jim Watts to monitor our investments on a daily basis. I am pleased with our portfolio of equities and fixed income that are fairly conservatively invested, with concentrations in blue-chip equities and investment grade bonds.

Ministry and Counsel

NCYM Ministry and Counsel met at 10:00 am on Saturday, August 6, 2011 at Forsyth Friends Meeting in Winston-Salem, NC. More than 100 Friends representing all nine quarters were present.

J. J. Jacobson, pastor of Forsyth Friends, opened with prayer. A period of open worship and a Devotional message by Linda Selleck, Clerk of Ministry and Counsel, followed. Reports from the Ministry and Counsel Executive Committee, the Nominating Committee, the Spiritual Life Commission, and the Recording Committee were presented.

Linda Selleck noted the charge of last year's gathering to the Executive Committee to work on a better way of coordinating the work of the Nominating Committee. The Executive Committee met four times last year, and spent considerable time working through the numerous questions and challenges the Nominating process has encountered. Recommendations for changes were presented and discussed at length. Here follows those approved changes.

APPROVED NCYM MINISTRY & COUNSEL NOMINATING COMMITTEE CHANGES

The following recommendations were approved by NCYM Ministry and Counsel in session on August 6, 2011. These changes will be sent to the Yearly Meeting office to update the NCYM Administrative Handbook.

1. Beginning immediately after the rise of the August 6, 2011 NCYM Ministry and Counsel gathering, all four positions (Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Recording Clerk, Assistant Recording Clerk) will begin a three-year rotating appointment, with a phase-out of these appointments starting in 2012.
2. NCYM Ministry & Counsel clerks and committee appointments will begin each year of service at the rise of the annual NCYM sessions, and end that year of service at the rise of the next annual NCYM sessions. If there is a transition of clerks, they will coordinate their work between the NCYM Ministry and Counsel meeting and the Yearly Meeting sessions, and continue their tasks until completed.
3. Friends may be re-appointed for an additional 3 year term, to serve a maximum of 6 continuous years.
4. After at least one year, Friends may be appointed to serve again.
5. The Convener of the Nominating Committee for NCYM Ministry and Counsel will be the Assistant Clerk of NCYM Ministry and Counsel, and will work closely with the Chairperson of the Nominating Committee.
6. The Chairperson of the Nominating Committee will be appointed by the Quarter responsible for Ministry and Counsel Nominating Committee oversight through annual rotations.
 - Therefore, Eastern Quarter will be charged to appoint this Chairperson for 2011-2012.
 - Quarterly Meeting Ministry & Counsels, or their designees, are asked to make their appointment as soon as possible after the annual Ministry and Counsel meeting, and inform the Clerk and Assistant Clerk of NCYM Ministry and Counsel.
 - Once appointed, the Chairperson of the Nominating Committee is to begin serving immediately.
 - Both the Friend appointed to chair the Nominating Committee, and that Quarter's representative to NCYM Ministry and Counsel, will serve on the Nominating Committee.
 - We recommend that Quarters appoint their representative to NCYM Ministry and Counsel for more than a one year period.
7. The rotating Quarter's appointed Chair of the Nominating Committee will also be a member of the NCYM Ministry and Counsel Executive Committee.
8. When a NCYM Ministry and Counsel position becomes vacant, it will remain vacant until Ministry and Counsel fills that position.

A letter from Yadkin Valley Quarterly Meeting of Friends, dated July 17, 2011, was read that nominated Hobert Freeman, pastor of Mountain View Friends Meeting, to be placed under the care of the Recording Committee. After discussion and hearing from Hobert, his nomination was approved.

Wallace Sills reported for the Nominating Committee. He and Eddie Oakley of Deep River Quarter worked throughout the spring with representatives from all nine quarters. Wallace presented their roster of Friends nominated for the various Ministry and Counsel clerk and committee openings. All names were approved. This list is included with the Yearly Meeting Reports.

Brady Morrison reported for the Spiritual Life Commission. The 2011 Minute of Advice, comprised from the Spiritual Condition Reports of thirty-nine monthly meetings, was read and approved. The 2011 Minute of Advice is included with the Yearly Meeting Reports. Brady also noted that the Ministers and Elders Conference was held at Cane Creek Friends Meeting on February 5, 2011. The themes of the history of Friends and spiritual gifts, and the discerning of spiritual gifts, were presented by Ron Selleck and Michael Fulp, Jr. The Spiritual Life Commission will hold their 3rd Revival Gathering on Saturday, October 15, 2011 at Hopewell Friends Meeting, beginning with a workshop on generational differences at 3:00 p.m. The Worship Service begins at 6:15 p.m., and the worship speakers are Daniel Thames and Jennifer York. A Junior Friends program is offered.

Daniel Thames, Chairperson of the Recording Committee, gave their report. David Brindle, the former chair, moved out of state in the early winter, and Daniel, the Assistant Chair, accepted David's position. The

Recording Committee had oversight over 31 candidates in the past year. They have worked diligently on many items. A new brochure, *A Guide for the Process of Recording a Minister of the Gospel*, was distributed that will be an excellent tool for monthly meetings and potential recording candidates. Also distributed was the *2011 Revised Handbook of Procedures*. After noting all changes and additions to the previous Handbook, the 2011 edition was approved. The committee reported two additional changes in guidelines for candidates: 1) the previous three year minimum requirement has been changed to two to three years, depending on the individual candidate's history with Friends and with NCYM, and 2) candidates are expected to complete their requirements within five to six years.

Daniel reported on the satisfactory completion of all recording work by Georgianne Satterfield, Sarah Vestal, Richard Wilcox, and Jennifer York. Ministry and Counsel approved all four Friends to be recorded a Minister of the Gospel of Christ during the next session of NC Yearly Meeting, and invited these Friends to speak to the gathering. Daniel reported, that after considerable discussion and deliberation, the following Friends were recommended to be discontinued from the recording process: Tom Barton, Stephen Caudill, and William Garner. The removal of these Friends was approved.

Daniel reported also on the recommendation to discontinue Debbie Parvin from the recording process. After his comments, a lengthy discussion followed with participation from many Friends present, along with the reading of a joint letter of support for Debbie's recording from New Garden Friends Meeting, Fancy Gap Friends Meeting (Preparatory), and Mt. Airy Friends Meeting. No action was taken on the recommendation for Debbie. We approved sending a report of the concerns expressed by the Recording Committee, along with the letter of support for Debbie Parvin's recording, to all monthly meeting Ministry and Counsel clerks. Afterward John Porter recommended that this information be sent also to monthly meeting clerks and our Yearly Meeting ministers and pastors. We thanked Forsyth Friends Meeting for their hospitality and delicious lunch. The next gathering of NCYM Ministry and Counsel will be on Saturday, August 4, 2012 at 10:00 a.m. Bethesda Friends Meeting in Dunn, NC has volunteered to host this gathering.

Recording Committee

This has been a very busy year for the Recording Committee. With thirty-one candidates under our care, we have stretched the capacity of our regular meeting times trying to meet with each one. It is a wonderful situation in which to find ourselves. In addition to meeting with the candidates, we have been very busy updating some of our literature. All in all, we see that it has been a wonderfully productive year.

The committee began the year under the leadership of David Brindle serving as chairperson. Daniel Thames was chosen to be the assistant chairperson. Wayne Lamb continues to serve as registrar. In January, David Brindle turned in his resignation to the Recording Committee sharing that he would be moving out of state. Daniel Thames was approved to serve as chairperson in February. Sara Beth Terrell was approved to serve as assistant chairperson. Members of the committee expressed their appreciation for David's years of service on the Recording Committee and as chairperson for several years.

This committee has been charged in recent years with making a brochure to enhance communication between local meetings and quarterly meetings and the Recording Committee. In response to this charge, the Recording Committee created a new brochure intended to provide easy access to the information that is relevant when a local meeting or quarterly meeting is considering to recommend someone to go under the care of the committee. Most of the wording in the brochure comes straight from the relevant sections of *Faith and Practice* and our Handbook of Procedures. A few queries have been added that the committee thinks will be very helpful in determining whether the person is ready for the process of recording. The brochure will be mailed to pastors, clerks of local ministry and counsels, and the clerks of all quarterly meetings.

The Recording Committee has also revised its Handbook of Procedures this year. There are only minor changes to the body of the handbook. These include adding footnotes to the introduction and changing the margins and fonts to reduce the total number of pages. The one substantive change occurs on page 7 and adds section H which states that "candidates must supply the committee with information the committee needs to run a criminal background check. Background checks are required during the first year under the care of the committee." This change reflects the committee's decision to require all candidates to undergo a criminal background check as a part of our process.

Changes were also made to Appendix A – Curriculum Requirements for Recording Candidates. The committee approved some minor changes which are reflected in the following list of topics: General – Theology, Church History and Spiritual Disciplines; Biblical Studies – General/Biblical Interpretation, Old Testament and New Testament; Quaker Studies – History, Theology, Spirituality, Worship, Life and Action and North Carolina Yearly Meeting; Role of the Pastor – Preaching 1, Preaching 2/Practicum, Administration, Counseling, Youth and Christian Education and Leadership Topics. The committee also approved requiring the reading of the Old Testament and New Testament when candidates take our classes to fulfill their requirements in those areas.

One area where the committee is seeing some changes in its work is reflected in the number of folks who are seeking recording as a

requirement for their work in the area of chaplaincy. Many agencies now require some form of denominational endorsement. The committee has set forth their desire to take the next year and research all the implications of these changes and determine whether there is a need to adapt our own process for those whose ministry is chaplaincy.

The committee made the following recommendations to Yearly Meeting Ministry and Counsel on August 6, 2011 at Forsyth Friends Meeting concerning candidates under the care of the Recording Committee:

- 1) Recording as a minister – Georgianne Satterfield, Sarah Vestal, Richard Wilcox and Jennifer York. These were approved.
- 2) Recognized as Accepted Pastoral Supply – None.
- 3) Continue under the care of the committee – Betsy Blake, Travis Briles, Danielle Brown, Ernest Brown, Michael Butler, Michael Coats, Josh Conrad, Gary Lee Crum, Brandon Dockery, Brandon Godfrey, Joey Greene, Sheila Hoyer, J.J. Jacobson, Kathy Kellum, Lisa Lundeen-Nagel, Andrew Needham, Frank Massey, David Millikan, Lisa Moran, Loren Pierce-Coleman, Amanda Smith, Michael Thames and William Vaughan.
- 4) Discontinue the recording process – Tom Barton, Stephen Caudill, William Garner and Debbie Parvin.

Ministry and Counsel approved the recommendations for Tom Barton, Stephen Caudill and William Garner. No action was taken on the recommendation for Debbie Parvin.

Two people were placed under the care of the Recording Committee during Ministry and Counsel sessions: from Western Quarter, Cathy Moody; and from Yadkin Valley Quarter, Hobert Freeman.

The Recording Committee looks forward to another wonderfully productive year as we continue with the work you have entrusted to us!

Spiritual Life Commission

The Commission has focused most of its attention on three projects: 1) the Ministers and Elders Conference, 2) the Spiritual Condition Reports and Minute of Advice process and 3) Spiritual Renewal or Revival.

This year's Ministers and Elders Conference was held at Cane Creek Friends Meeting on the topic of discerning spiritual gifts. Between seventy-five and one hundred Friends were in attendance to hear presenters Ron Selleck and Michael Fulp, Jr.

The process of preparing Spiritual Condition Reports seems to require a lot of prompting and guidance from the Spiritual Life Commission. Done right, these reports can have tremendous value for the individual meetings and are very helpful to the Commission in the preparation of the Minute of Advice. This year thirty-nine meetings submitted reports to the Yearly Meeting Office, with the best response coming from Western Quarter where nine meetings submitted a Report. The Minute of Advice for 2011 was recommended by the Yearly Meeting on Ministry and Counsel to the 314th Annual Session of North Carolina Yearly Meeting for approval.

A Revival Gathering will be held at Hopewell Friends Meeting on Saturday, October 15 beginning with a workshop on generational differences at 3:00 PM (note time change). Box dinners will be provided for a cost and Friends will be asked to register in advance to receive the box dinners. The theme is "Here I am; Direct My Path; a blended intergenerational experience". Worship will be a blending of old and new worship styles and will begin at 6:15 PM with a time of praise-worship. It is hoped that friends will be led to consider God's call on our lives, particularly as He calls Friends into the work of His ministry.

The Spiritual Life Commission welcomes input into its work from all Friends in North Carolina Yearly Meeting.

Minute of Advice for 2011

I have given them your word and the world has hated them, for they are not of the world any more than I am of the world. [John 17:14]

While our Lord has called us out of the world and into His Kingdom, we remain instruments in His hands for the work of bringing the Kingdom of God on earth. [Matthew 6:10] Seek the Holy Spirit's leading to fulfill our call to His Kingdom work.

In Matthew 7:13 our Lord called the path "strait" and yet we know that it is not always "straight". We encounter questions where simplistic answers or treasured traditions do not suffice and, in some cases, may confuse rather than reveal the way of the Kingdom.

Matters addressed in this Minute are grouped under three headings "Faithful Service, Economic Challenge and Change", "Authentic Community" and "Cautions".

Faithful Service, Economic Challenge and Change:

Faithful attendance of meetings for worship, the building up of a Christian body and a general wide-range of participation in the life of a meeting is of paramount importance today. Christians are called to be a part of the organized church, which Christ has promised to build as an impregnable defense against the power of Hell. When we

neglect to attend and fully participate in our meeting's work, the church is weakened both spiritually and financially, and we are ineffective in the work of the Kingdom. While our weak economy contributes to the financial struggles of many of our meetings, financial health is also directly related to attendance and participation.

Some meetings have seized the opportunity created by our sluggish economy by enlisting membership to fill in the gaps created when giving falls short of need. Some meetings find opportunities to minister to the needy, such as by offering free meals or making the meeting house available as a refuge for the homeless.

Our heritage grew out of a seventeenth century movement of young adults. Similarly, if we are to bring in the Kingdom of God today, then we must encourage the leadership of our current generation of young adults who want to be actively involved in the work of North Carolina Yearly Meeting. We must encourage their enthusiasm! Modification of our worship methods may be required to assure that our faith and practice speaks to younger generations of Christians. Styles of worship music, methods of worship and perhaps our "Quaker traditions" must be prayerfully reconsidered. Friends should open-mindedly consider whether multiple meetings for worship would be best or one meeting that blends intergenerational music and methods. While some meetings may not need to change their practices, caution is needed in pursuing such a course. Friends should also be cautious to assure that our purpose is worship of the living Christ rather than mere entertainment.

Many meetings have trod on the boundaries of change and found themselves mired in the quicksand of self-centered conflict and destructive contention. Friends are encouraged to assure that change occurs in a friendly Christ-like manner. Natural Church Development and the development of Church Health Teams can be helpful in confronting the need for change in a manner befitting the name "Christian". (Resources and leaders are available through the Yearly Meeting.)

Of utmost importance is the faithful presentation of the gospel. The methods of our worship will change, but the message must always remain the same – Jesus Christ, crucified for the sins of all who will believe in Him; alive through resurrection power over death, hell and the grave; and at work through the power of the Holy Spirit in our world today. Methods of worship notwithstanding, meetings should be acutely aware that a personal knowledge of God's saving grace is essential if our meetings are to be strong.

Authentic Community:

Attention should be given to maintaining fellowship throughout the week. A variety of opportunities for contact, both in small groups and in larger settings, is desirable. The need for ongoing communication

among meeting participants poses special problems in these days when the range of communication is from telephoning to texting. In addition to opportunities for gathering during the week, some meetings are using telephone system features such as “Callingpost” (for older adults), email, texting and other internet services to maintain contact and offer encouragement to meeting participants. Christians can easily become isolated in a very non-Christian world, and a variety of communication methods may be required to effectively reach the entire congregation.

Cautions:

Some of our traditions may have lost some significance today and the time may have come to place a few of them in a less prominent place in the life and testimony of Friends. However, it is important that our children, youth and young adults are taught to appreciate the continuing relevance of the underlying values of Friends’ history and traditions.

Friends across a wide spectrum of our Yearly Meeting identify Satan and the appeal of worldly values to be the greatest threat to the Kingdom Work. While open to the pure leadings of the Holy Spirit, we must also remain vigilant to resist the trickery of Satan who often calls us to embrace worldly values as “divine leadings”. Our testimony is that divine leadings “cannot, and never would, contradict the outward testimony of the scriptures or proper and sound judgment.” [Barclay’s Apology, Second Proposition]

Many of our meetings identify “complacency” as a major threat to the Kingdom Work. Some very strong meetings are continuously seeking to learn how new and sometimes longer-term participants slip away. There may be a need to mend gates of fellowship in areas that have previously gone undetected. Mending sometimes calls for forgiveness, and at other times, more openness. There may also be structural barriers that need to be addressed such as a lack of effective opportunities for families to worship and participate fully in the life of the meeting.

Summary:

“Be very careful, then, how you live--not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the Lord’s will is. Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit. Speak to one another with psalms, hymns and spiritual songs. Sing and make music in your heart to the Lord, always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.”

Much of the planning and presentations were greatly aided by a Peace Group that has met regularly during the year.

We owe a great deal to the Guilford College United Methodist Church for hosting the Peace Conference. They provided us with genuine southern hospitality.

We also thank Kathy Coe, Judy Caldwell-Midero and Lee Van Hughes for agreeing to judge the essay contest.

We are continuing to develop a program of Peace Reflections in order to better ascertain the depth of the peace testimony among the members of North Carolina Yearly Meeting.

Program Ministries Department

2010-2011 can be noted as a season of “taking hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me...forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead...pressing on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me...” Philippians 3:13-14.

Program Ministries Department consists of many people that volunteer their time, energy, and passion in order to offer opportunities of spiritual growth, leadership development, community building, and service to Friends, communities, and the world. Our staff, boards, committees, and multitude of volunteers have exemplified through their spirits and service to be people that are striving for the future that God has designed and is calling us today and tomorrow. MOWA Choctaw Friends Center, Friends Campus Ministries, Quaker Lake, Christian Education, Youth, Young Adults, and our Interns, are all witnessing to a common focus of releasing the past and pressing on toward the challenges, gifts, and blessing of our Lord.

Educational field trips were developed at Quaker Lake with enormous interest throughout the area schools, bringing in over 800 children. We celebrated the out pouring of over 100 volunteers that assisted with the Pumpkin Fall Festival, hosting 1150 in attendance. Christian Education

Committee joined Quaker Lake Program Committee with the Fall Festival and a spring event – Easter Egg Roll Eggstravaganza. Walkers and runners enjoyed an up close and personal look at the new Quaker Lake land purchased as they participated in a 5/10K, cross country trail run. So much more to celebrate with Quaker Lake: Fox 8's fantastic coverage in a special news segment; 725 summer campers and an AMAZING summer staff; a new kiln thanks to USFW; and a full schedule of user groups.

Christian Education Committee also teamed with Young Friends Activities Committee in sponsoring and leading workshops for “Amped,” a day of training and appreciation for volunteers working with children and youth. Jamaica Yearly Meeting has established priorities and strategic planning for partnering with us in efforts addressing Pastoral and Leadership Development. CE Committee continues to provide teaching resources and curriculum based upon requests from our meetings.

Young Friends Activities Committee leaped into new options and possibilities through Serenity and SOUL this year. Serenity featured one of the largest youth choirs of recent years and was able to visit each of our Quarters. Thank you Cedar Square and Marlboro for the extra hospitality and generosity for providing our large group with transportation. Youth Tremors maxed out in numbers studying the Fruit of the Spirit - “Live the Sweet Life”. Although we were disappointed to cancel the SOUL week to Mexico, the experience in Eastern Quarter, joining efforts with Up River to offer a sports week for the community, was absolutely a prize from God. “Reflect Jesus” was our SOUL theme for the two amazing weeks in Alabama for sports camp (80) and Bible school (85), as well as, Eastern Quarter (30). Stefanie Johnson as our Director, along with a wonderful staff and volunteers, helped to guide our 91 visiting workers as they ministered.

Our Young Adults have truly sought to bring alive their epistle presented at Annual Gathering last year. They have participated in an Emerging Leaders Conference (FUM); offered a beach retreat based on 2Corinthians 4:16-18 “Be the Change”; hosted “Jingle All the Way” – a 5/10K walk/run, worship gathering, with over 80 participants; and collected over 200 toys and food items for MOWA. They hosted a winter retreat with Randy Quate as the speaker and a simulcast study and worship experience at Quaker Lake on Good Friday. Several young adults have visited Executive Committee, Monthly Meetings, and various groups sharing their passion and focus as expressed in their epistle.

Friends Campus Ministries continues to erupt in pockets scattered across our state. We have Quaker student-led worship groups at UNC-G/Greensboro area, NCSU/Raleigh, Western Carolina area, Charlotte, and Campbell University. UNC-G students studied Crazy Love by Franci Chan and students from the Greensboro and Raleigh area attended the Passion Conference focusing on worship (25) over their Christmas

break. These college students tend to be very involved in Yearly Meeting programs and opportunities, such as: 5K, Pumpkin Festival, and speakers for Tremors.

Interns are certainly not limited to the young adult generation, but this group is on fire to serve. What once was a summer opportunity is definitely a year-round ministry. Our Young Adult Committee has helped with some sponsorship and seeking individuals to fill needs. MOWA Friends Center reaped the dedication of three: Will Allen, Bryce Kincaid, and Sterling Brown; and now looks forward to more to come this fall. We continue to average 20-25 internships within a year.

The Kendall's have hit the ground running in their first full year of ministry as our MOWA Choctaw Friends Center Directors. The many visitors, groups, and outreach opportunities are claimed as prizes and celebrations. Our Yearly Meeting responded with such generosity our Thanksgiving Basket and Christmas Box collection efforts and the school supplies (more details in their report).

Leadership development continues to be a common focus among the staff in helping to facilitate these ministry opportunities. A Spiritual Gifts Assessment, All Committee Day, Clerk Training, and Young Friends Clerking Workshop are a few highlights of connecting efforts. May God find us faithful as we seek what He has before us, rather than hanging onto a legacy...

MOWA Choctaw Friends Center

Tim and Ann Kendall and family have been our MOWA Directors since 2010. Their four school-age children attend the local Leroy School System and the two eldest attend William Carey University in Mississippi. Serving God has been their passion and vocation since 1992. Overseeing all parts of the ministry is a full time job for the couple and their children.

The Team-2-Tutor After School Program is successfully changing the lives of children on a one-to-one basis. A recent graduate of our program went to the state level in the National Spelling Bee. Consistent encouragement, love, and Quaker disciplines are continuing to shape young lives. The Program is sad to lose Will Allen as our school director, yet very pleased to see him continue to develop in his missionary endeavors as he heads to China this fall. Interns Bryce Kincaid and Sterling Brown completed their faithful service in Alabama at the end of December.

The Resale Shop is open once a week for anyone who needs clothing or household items. The Sanktown community continues to need and

appreciate this ministry. We continue needing the help of many for replenishment of goods and clothing.

Youth activities from Basketball Tournaments to regular Youth Meeting are eagerly attended. Special events common to most youth groups happen here at MOWA too. The Christian Concert series, *Winter Jam*, was a highlight for many, held in nearby Mobile. MOWA supports the community youth with transportation to local football games and other school events so that kids enjoy a richness of experiences in life. Youth, age 8 to 12, are the largest numbered group of children in our area. This has required some revamping of our Youth group as we target ministry to this age group.

Sanktown is a close-knit community where practically everyone is related to everyone else. The sense of community is very strong and meals shared are an important part of this culture. The MOWA Center continues to host monthly community meals with an opportunity for anyone who wants to participate to “come on in.”

As with most charity organizations, there are many requests for financial assistance. The MOWA Board has a process and procedures established to channel this aspect of ministry. It involves asking appropriate questions and seeking steps for families to take to overcome obstacles that feed to the chronic poverty issues. We are careful in stewardship to pay utilities, pharmacy, and doctor visits. Temporary work was provided for several people in exchange for financial assistance. Requests for home repair are frequent; however, in recent months, several community members have been able to provide supplies needed. We help with labor. Our food pantry is often used and appreciated by those unable to find assistance through other agencies. Several local churches in the area have had to close their food pantries due to the economy, making the MOWA pantry one of the few operating in our county. The Thanksgiving outreach provided holiday meals in the households of 80 families. Christmas time brought a special joy when we were able to discreetly deliver toys and food staples to 30 families. One grandmother had told us she wouldn't be giving gifts to her grandkids this year due to extreme hardship. We can only imagine the joy she had in giving the gifts we slipped in her back door, preventing her from being empty handed at her family event.

The rarest resource of the MOWA Center is time. Tim and Ann filter requests, put them into the time frame available in their schedule, and keep the regularly scheduled programs all flowing. Hospitality remains a meaningful part of the ministry. Visitors bring expertise, willing hands, and encouragement to the MOWA Center. Since Sept 1, 2010, MOWA has hosted 205 overnight visitors, many of those people for a week at a time. Our visitor list includes: the MOWA Board, Pat Cheadle, Ann Hume, Sitler family, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Winslow, John Carroll, and Phil Andrew. Work teams hosted by: Holly Spring Friends, Yadkin Quarter, and Charlie Routh. Vet students from Auburn and Tuskegee Institute,

rummage delivery by Quaker Men from Western Yearly Meeting and Joe and Jeff Allen, and a VBS team from Camby Community Church, Camby IN. SOUL participants from Westfield, Concord, Back Creek, Cedar Square, Holly Spring, Pilot View and South Fork Friends Meetings and Emmaus Baptist Church.

Through our summer ministries we served over 1,600 individual meals to both visitors and local people. One of the groups fundraised and started construction of a much needed 24' x 30' covered deck accommodating outdoor meals and shelter, and overflow problems.

In 2010-2011, a new bathroom was added upstairs in the Lodge, a fire escape door, and stairs rebuilt. This aids in the safety of moving people in and out of the main lodge. A large center island was built from existing cabinets and a new counter designed in the Director's home. Portions of the fence were scraped and painted, one of our trailers repainted, three local houses repaired or painted. Cabinetry from upstairs in the lodge was relocated to downstairs to provide a serving and drink station for bigger teams. Teams visited and prayed with our neighbors, taught arts and crafts, read to children, picked up trash, mowed lawns of some of our neighbors. A garden and chicken project were added to the Center grounds. In addition to continuing to compost, we are encouraging stewardship by using as little Styrofoam and plastic as possible. We strive to use only recyclable paper that can be composted by the Center. The backyard of the Director's home is slowly being revamped to allow outdoor social activities, when privacy is preferred.

The Center is used daily as weather allows by many different groups of people from kids riding bikes, to older teens playing ball, couples bringing young ones to the swings, or some people simply seeking a few moments of solace and sitting on a bench. Several birthday parties and a baby shower were enjoyed by many neighbors on the grounds. Two new security lights were added for better surveillance at night. A video surveillance system has been purchased and is being installed.

Thank you to all of you that have been a part of this ministry during this past year. As we move into a new school year, your help is needed once again. We are looking for individuals, meetings or quarterly meetings to help sponsor our After School Program kids through our Team-2-Tutor Program. We also need volunteers to help work with the kids. Do you have a week, a month, or several months available? We would love to have you come visit.

Quaker Lake Board

With the support of friends in the form of time, talent, and finances, various enhancements to our physical facilities and ministries are accomplished at Quaker Lake. An example of this is the roofing of four winter cabins by meetings and their members. *The Bridge* newsletter has been revived and is being used to keep F(f)riends updated on the property. The new building at the site is used by many Yearly Meeting groups and committees for a varying list of activities. The acquisition of the Hemphill-Brown property has provided the opportunity to expand activities, bike trails, nature trails, and other things. The property must now be paid for. It is prayerfully anticipated that members of the Yearly Meeting and others who benefit from using Quaker Lake will make contributions to eliminate this debt. The use of a Sunday in May for a special offering in each Meeting designated as "Quaker Lake Appreciation Day" can be a boost to this debt fund. It is hoped that this will be a regular collection each year in each Meeting.

Even though the budget for Quaker Lake has been cut, needed and required maintenance is done. This can be evidenced in the re-surfacing of the pool which is used by campers and site visitors during the warmer months of the year. Another upcoming need will be a new, or gently used, tractor. If such an item exists in the Yearly Meeting that is seeking a home, please remember Quaker Lake and its needs.

The Board has also decided to take another step in advertising our facilities. There is a video available which gives a virtual tour.

There is no other facility or camp of the same quality as Quaker Lake with its many offerings anywhere. This important ministry of North Carolina Yearly Meeting must be kept vital and viable through Friends good stewardship and appreciation related to this site.

Publications Board

The NCYM Publications Board met three times (with one or two more meetings planned for after 2011 NCYM sessions) during 2011 with good attendance and excellent cooperation by all of its members. The Annual Meeting included workshops, speakers, and worship time, as well as meetings for business. We were excited to be part of the European release celebration for the second QUIP Quaker Youth Book project, Spirit Rising. Several youth and young adults from North Carolina Yearly Meeting have essays published in this book. Beth Saunders and Rausie Hobson agreed to be part of the

program committee for QUIP 2012 which will meet May 10-13, 2012 at Pendle Hill Conference Center, Philadelphia, PA. Rausie Hobson also continues to update the QUIP database of Quaker books, found at www.quakerquip.org.

The Publications Board reminds all readers to view their page "Resources" on the NCYM-FUM website. Almost every title printed by the NCYM Publications Board has a thumbnail photo of the cover, for easier identification and ordering. Ongoing projects include the second volume of short biographies of NCYM leaders, written by Billy Britt; a new children's story set in Snow Camp, NC, by Bobbie Teague; an update and reprint of the Spring Friends Meeting history; keeping NCYM Faith and Practice in print; the annual inventory of books on hand; and as always, consideration of several manuscripts relevant to the NCYM history or procedure.

Income for publications, including reprinting NCYM Faith and Practice, comes only from three small trust funds. As with other NCYM groups receiving income from trust funds, this income amount has decreased through the years while the expenses have grown exponentially. This board tries to keep in print useful publications (pamphlets and Faith and Practice) as well as assist in the editing and publication of books and pamphlets of historical value to Friends in the NCYM area. Authors and editors of NCYM publications are not paid for their work; their donation helps keep our publication costs down. All Yearly Meeting members are encouraged to buy, read, and promote these publications, so that these informative books will continue to be available.

Right Sharing of World Resources

Right Sharing of World Resources (RSWR) is an independent, Quaker organization which provides financial support in the form of

grants, to new, small organizations working with the poorest of the poor (including Quakers) around the world. RSWR is an independent organization and, as such, does not have representatives from yearly meetings. However, half of the yearly meetings in the United States provide direct support, and RSWR receives individual support from within virtually all yearly meetings in the US. For that reason, this report is provided, to be used and distributed, as deemed appropriate, within the yearly meeting.

Like many non-profits, RSWR saw a partial financial recovery from the financial downturn of 2008-2009. At the same time, RSWR was able to continue its level of support to its grant-making work and to see significant developments with its capital campaign, which was begun July 1, 2008. For 2009, RSWR notes the following highlights:

- **Total income of \$426,100**
- **Total expense of \$438,350**
- **\$272,945 to directly support grants, training, and support to local organizations**
- **Grants to 51 organizations in south India, Kenya, and Sierra Leone, representing direct support to 750-1,000 women.**
- **In October, 2009 initiated the Kenya field staff program with the engagement of Samson Ababu. The south India field staff program, with Dr. R. Kannan, was begun in July, 2008.**
- **Reached the half-way point of our \$2.3 million capital campaign to move RSWR to a new level of programming.**
- **Moved resources from the support of in-person RSWR presentations to the support of an electronic communications program, to be initiated in July, 2010**

The heart of RSWR is a partnership. On one side of the partnership are Quakers here in the United States, and other persons of faith who seek to live more justly, and who provide capital to help support micro-enterprise projects. On the other side of the partnership are women's self-help groups who, with the guidance of local non-governmental organizations and by their participation in the self-help group, implement the micro-enterprise project.

This is what distinguishes the work of RSWR and some other faith-based groups from many other micro-enterprise groups. The wealth that RSWR redistributes from Americans to the poorest of the poor is a grant of capital. RSWR understands that God calls us to jubilee justice, to wealth redistribution. Our partners who receive the grant are women's self-help groups who hold and manage the funds in common, making loans to members to implement small-scale, income-generating businesses, and increasing their wealth, their lives, and the well-being of their families.

Most of the expenses of the Yearly Meeting's diverse programs are paid for by the Askings that come from each monthly meeting

In the November 2010 representative body meeting, it was requested that Steward-Finance inquire of meetings that were not paying their Askings in full. In early 2011, these letters were sent out. To summarize the response from these letters, I would say that some meetings are seeking to match outflows (Askings in this case) with inflows. Some meetings are funding Askings with alternative formulas that result in less than full payment per member. While some of these situations are not new, this divergent funding practice results in budget challenges that are difficult to overcome. The funding for medical premiums and pastor retirement continue to be challenging because the funding liability is not exactly known (depends on ever increasing insurance premiums and actuary derived funding requests). Please pray about this situation as the Spirit leads you.

Meetings all over North Carolina Yearly Meeting are seeking to do God's work with God's resources and are seeking guidance to these challenging times. Thank you for all you do and will do.

Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee – Isaiah 26:3. As Christians we believe we share a responsibility to embrace and share God's peace with those around us. It may be tempting to get caught up in the financial turmoil that our country is experiencing but we hope and pray that North Carolina Yearly Meeting can weather this storm together and emerge more unified.

While we certainly do not welcome our current financial challenges, we do welcome the opportunity to reevaluate our priorities, both as individuals and as a Yearly Meeting. Stewardship and Finance Committee's theme is to increase awareness of the many vital ministries that North Carolina Yearly Meeting sponsors; and in so doing, encourage each meeting to continue funding their askings. We are grateful that most meetings are continuing to strive to fund these vital ministries through their Askings. Report of Trustees of Trust Funds Fiscal Year April 1, 2010 to March 31, 2011

The Trustees of Trust Funds for North Carolina Yearly Meeting of Friends submit this report for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2011. The Trustees have continued to follow a policy of prudent investment and

reinvestment of funds that have been entrusted to us while at the same time attempting to maximize income for the benefit of the named beneficiaries.

As of year end, approximately 10.19 percent of the assets of the General trust funds was invested in fixed interest bonds; approximately 76.10 percent was invested in equities; 7.63 percent in other assets with the remainder invested in Cash, Money Market accounts and Mutual Funds. Steps are being taken to rebalance the allocation of equities to 75% or less.

The market continues to show improvement, however the dividends are still suffering from reductions. The Trustees still believe that the four percent payout is the best benefit for the committees of North Carolina Yearly Meeting. The recipients received a slight increase in income this year. The amount distributed for the 2010-2011 year was \$190,520.32. North Carolina Yearly Meeting committees received \$186,411.92, Guilford College received \$3,001.37, Friends Homes received \$606.78 and North Carolina Quaker Men received \$500.25. The amount to be distributed for the 2011-2012 year will be \$200,331.85.

Contributions of \$3,905.00 were added to the principal of numerous funds in the General Trust Funds. Included in this amount is \$2,655.00 which was received to establish the Janet T. Morris Memorial Trust to benefit Quaker Lake Development. Additional funds are being raised to meet the \$5,000.00 minimum requirement to start a new trust. Distributions were made from the Williams Fund of \$40,000.00.

The Aged Ministers Fund received contributions of \$300.00. \$80,000.00 was received from the Share the Blessing II campaign pledges. Additional funds are forthcoming.

The MOWA Choctaw board asked the Trustees for \$100,000.00 as approved at the Representative Body meeting on August 12, 2006. The Trustees disbursed \$50,000.00 in December 2010 with the remainder to be paid in 2011.

Richard Coe, Secretary-Treasurer, reported to Representative Body at the November meeting.

Appreciation is extended to Wilson Sheldon for fourteen years of service with the Trustees of Trust Funds. Wilson has served faithfully and has done much to further the efforts of the Trustees in overseeing the investments of the Trust Funds. He has served as Chair for the past seven years. David Edgerton agreed to serve as Chair for the term of one year with Clark English serving as Vice-Chair.

The Trustees met several times this year with our representative from Charles Schwab. All accounts were reviewed for performance, including the account managed by Schwab.

The Trustees will continue to use their collective efforts to effectively manage the Trust Funds for the Yearly Meeting

United Society of Friends Women (NC)

The North Carolina USFW has been very active during this year. The Eliza Armstrong Cox Scholarships in the amount of \$4550 were awarded to 28 students from NCYM. \$1400 from the International Scholarship Fund was sent to Friends Theological College in Kenya.

We met at Centre Friends Meeting on May 7th for our annual Spring Conference with good attendance. Friends women who attended the USFWI Triennial in Kenya, Africa in July, 2010 gave the program highlighting their experiences at the conference and visits to Friends missions in the area. The Centre USFW provided a wonderful luncheon with festive decorations and table settings using the African theme. An offering of over \$3500 was taken for Quaker Lake to help purchase a new kiln for the craft hut.

Donations to the Summer Missions Project (Kid for Kids) were encouraged to help raise funds to purchase goats for Friends Theological College. It came to our attention that there was a need to help Audrey Afanda, daughter of John Muhanji, who is attending Guilford College. She came to Guilford with scholarships and grants to cover her tuition; however, these did not prove to be enough. At the end of the school year a balance of \$6,000 was owed so that she could register for the fall semester. The NC USFW stepped up and contributed \$3,000 to help meet this need. Funds were received from other sources and this balance has been paid in full. What a blessing this has been.

Our Annual Gathering was held at Quaker Lake on August 27, 2011 with Sylvia Graves, FUM General Secretary, as our guest speaker. New officers were installed for the upcoming year and we enjoyed a wonderful luncheon and time of fellowship together. The offering was taken for Friends Center at Guilford College.

The new theme for 2011-2012 is "Be Still and Know" taken from the scripture, *"Be still and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth."* Psalm 46:20 NIV. As you can see from this report, USFW societies in NCYM, whether they are small or large, are faithful in serving by giving, praying and educating themselves in the work that is to be done.

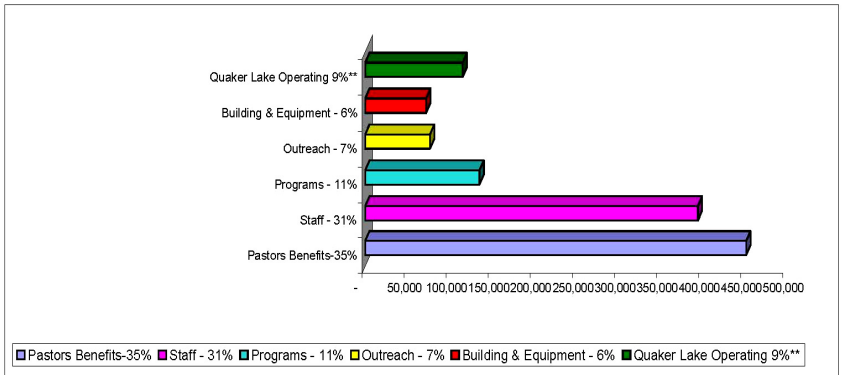
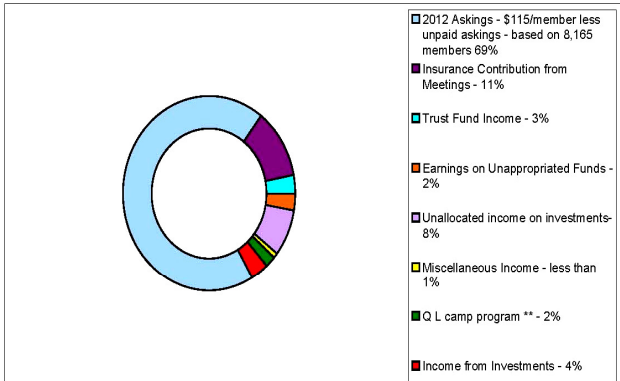
